meets, ammunition chests, supply and flare parachutes and many containers which carry food, medical supplies and military equipment to the armed forces. Local Scouts are observing the week by a thorough solicitation for the sale of War Stamps and Bonds.

More than 315,000 Boy Scouts have qualified as dispatch bearers for the Office of War Information. They carry official identification cards signed by Elmer Davis, dir-

ector of the Office of War Information and Liberty. K. Protwell, chief scout executive. The scout boys signed letters from President Roosevelt saying that their task is to carry to the people of our community vital information prepared by our Government and that "It is information which our citizens must have as we fight on to a final victory."

In their part in the "Food For Freedom" campaign last year, the Boy Scouts of America gave more than 100,000,000 hours of labor to the production and conservation of food. This is reported. 600,000 more active camps from which to the service of 25,000,000 needy workers in the country and more agricultural workers for one year. "As hard as we are working, this year the need will be greater. Opportunities to help our fellow Scouts accordingly, and planning even help, must be made."

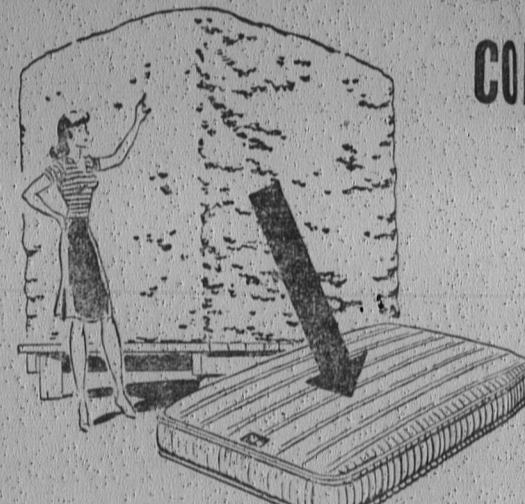

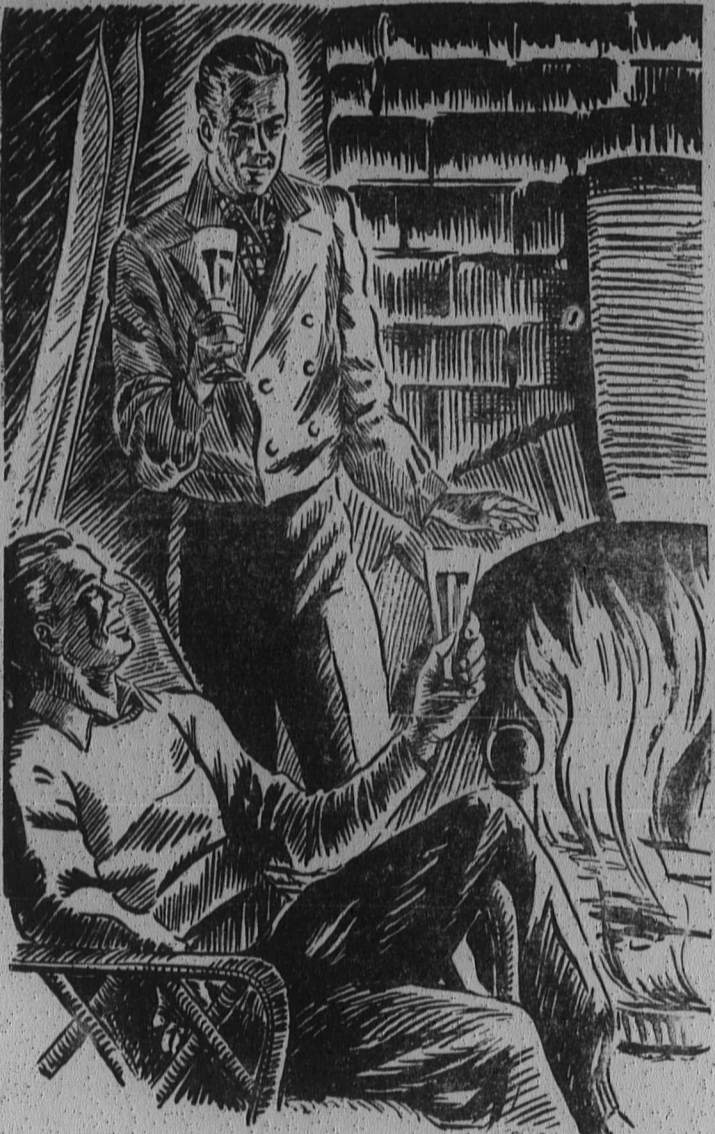

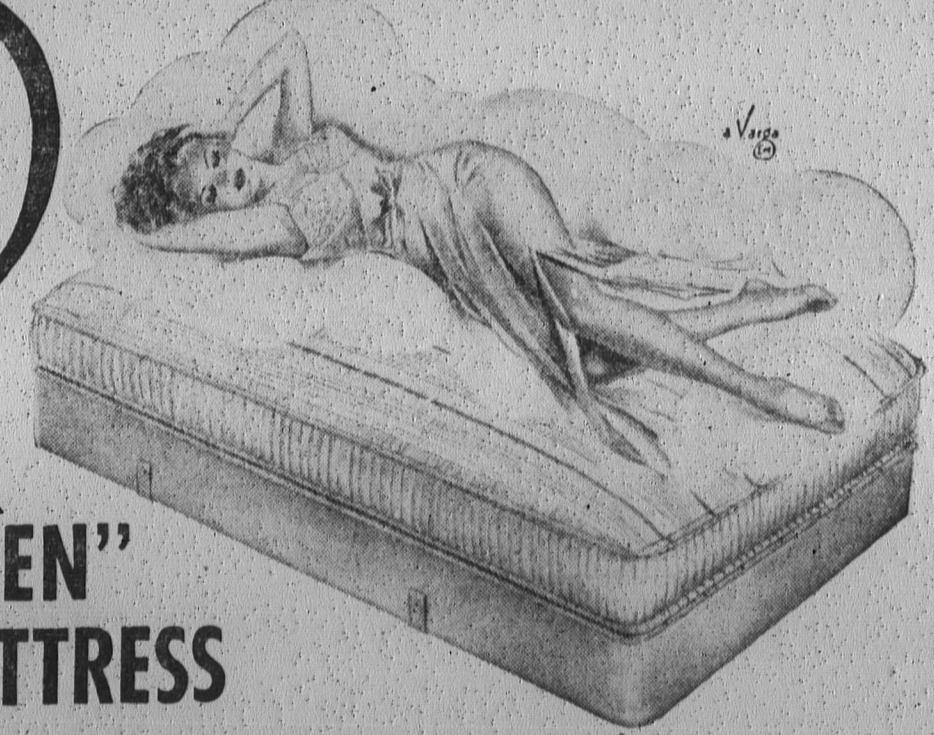
