THE BIBLE SPEAKS

GOD SAVED PAUL FOR A PATTERN—1 Tim. 1:16

The beloved Apostle Paul gives us the above lesson. Before he became a follower of the Lord, he had been a blasphemer, a persecutor and even had been injurious to the cause of Christ. It was to this class of people that the Lord came, bringing a message of love through which the way of redemption was made known. Paul says that even he was chief of sinners—1 Tim. 1:15. In that same verse he said, "that Christ Jesus came into this world to save sinners." Jesus made the same statement in Matt. 9:13: "How was Paul saved? Turn to Acts 3 and 16th chapters.

God called Paul to be his servant, and in order to make known the fact to him, God worked with him direct. He caused a bright light to shine about Paul, causing him to become blind.
