the 15th century when it was first introduced by the Catholic priests. Yet in spite of all the trouble the Christians had to bear, they remained true. For two centuries Japan closed her doors to the outside world until Commodore Perry forced her to open her ports for trade and missionaries. The missionaries found Christians among the Japanese people after those two hundred years of separation from outside Christian help or communication.

Mr. Shafer said that there are many good Japanese in Japan, as there are people in other countries but the majority are un-Christian and that is why we had Pearl Harbor. If there had been more Christians it would never have happened. He says the church's responsibility after this war is to Christianize Japan to prevent war in the future. Christian Japanese don't want war any more than Christian Americans.

Mr. Shafer explained why the Japanese people are so clean and their homes so spotless. He said that twice a year there was house cleaning under government inspection. If the house was clean a ribbon of one color was hung on the door; if the house failed to pass the examination another colored ribbon was hung on the door and the family must house-clean again and until the house passed inspection. This idea is very democratic but it would have its merits even in this country.

Nature Echoes Food Warning

War Food Administrator Masvin Jones' warning to the nation against over-optimism because "a food supply is a temporary thing that must constantly be replenished" was seconded by Mother Nature last month. The April showers that boosted national wheat prospects 60 million bushels also kept farmers everywhere from plowing and planting, resulting in less farm work finished by May 1 than in any season in many years. The U. S. farm army—men, women and children—are now engaged in a nation-wide counterattack to make

up the lost ground. Said Administrator Jones: "It is not time to permit our current supplies of food to shut off our view of the future. It is time to resolve and plan, work and sweat, so our past achievements will not have been in vain."
