Growers Should Order Containers

Growers and shippers of fruits and vegetables were reminded by the War Food Administration this week that they should order used containers now and be prepared to use substitutes for their customary sizes and types of containers in marketing their produce this season. Restrictions on the use of new wooden containers will go into effect July 1. A recent survey by WFA indicates that the nation this year may have 10 percent less round stove baskets and 20 percent fewer hampers produced than last year, while producers will need at least 10 percent more new containers than they had last year if fruit and vegetable crops are as large as those of 1942, which is not unlikely.
