Worth Clark and Glen Taylor are in the home stretch running neck and neck for the senatorial nomination on the democratic ticket. Taylor's steel, however, seems to have a little edge of seven votes and it may require the official canvass to determine the winner. Charles Gossett has a comfortable lead over all other opponents for the democratic nomination for Governor. Governor C. A. Bottrifsen for United States Senator and William Detweiler for governor, have substantial leads for the republican nomination.

Payette county democrats showed their displeasure with United States Senator D. Worth Clark when he recorded only 82 supporters in the county. Cowboy Glen Taylor had his raving steed in the prime of condition and he rode rough shod over his other opponents piling up 143 votes. Other candidates totals, Cornell's and Hawley 121. Homemakers' GUIDE

How To Dress Up Salad Dressings

A GOOD ready-to-use salad dressing is, in itself, guaranteed to add zest to a meal. But there are scores of simple little ways to make them even more zestful. For instance:

FOR RICH COLOR, combine shredded raw beet and the juice of 1/2 lemon with 1 cup salad dressing or mayonnaise—adds interest to any raw or cooked vegetable salad.

FOR HOT VEGETABLES, try this homemade hollandaise: mix 1 cup salad dressing or mayonnaise, 2 tps. prepared mustard, 1 tsp. lemon juice, and a dash of salt—piquant on cauliflower, for example.

FOR MEAT OR FISH, combine 2 tbsps. finely chopped chives (green tops of onions will do), with 1 cup salad dressing— toothsome on vegetable salads, too.

FOR DESSERTS, mix 1 cup salad dressing with 1/2 cup fruit juice (any kind), and use generously as a topping for fruits—may be sweetened by adding a bit of honey.
