Captain Stegall is now recuperating in a hospital from wounds received while on the front. The commendation states that he performed his duties in a superior manner. To my personal knowledge he even went forward in the infantry front lines in order to better adjust artillery fire on several occasions. On one he went forward with an anti-aircraft patrol to clear out some traps. On this mission he was shot in the arm and again in the leg. Even after he was shot and in great pain he encouraged our men and displayed the finest type of grit and courage. I wish to commend Capt. Stegall for the fine work he performed while in this command. He always exhibited a fine spirit of cooperation and did his duty in an industrious and efficient manner. It was a serious loss to this organization when he was shot in combat.
