Why Not Be Just a Christian?

It is only a matter of preference and taste as to what a man should religiously believe and he may would need to be greatly qualified over this question. One could adopt whatever belief he likes best and follow it sincerely and the outcome would be safe.

But there is a way that seems right unto a man, but the ends hereof are the ways of death—Prov. 14:12. "It is not in man that walketh to direct his steps"—Prov. 22:23. Most people think that any course honestly pursued will lead to glory; which is but another proof that man's ideas of religious things are usually wrong.

Jesus declared that many would come to Him "in that day" and protest that they had prophesied in His name and done many wonderful works to whom He will confess, "I never knew you depart from me ye that work iniquity." Therefore, He adds, "Whosoever heareth these sayings of mine and doeth them not what priests or doctors have commanded, 'I will smite him' unless a wise man who built his house upon a rock." And in verse 17, "Every one that dieth in these sayings of mine and doeth them not shall be likened unto a foolish man who built his house upon the sand."

Thinking by what some men said was enough to do for by any means living on theory one naturally would prefer if others did the same for us, but, in fact, that we can all be reasonably sure that what Christ has said, "The truth that I have spoken to you is not judgment him in the flesh,"—John 12:47. It is that, however, the word of Christ today does not mean the loss and nothing else.
