

**Lt. Millbrook Now Overseas**

HEADQUARTERS 13TH AAF, South Pacific—Second Lieutenant Vernon D. Millbrook, 23, son of Mr. and Mrs. S. J. Millbrook of 327 3rd Avenue north, Payette, is now serving overseas with a heavy bombardment squadron of the 13th AAF.

Lieutenant Millbrook is co-pilot of a B-24 Liberator bomber of the 13th AAF's crack "Long Rangers," where, from their Southwest Pacific base, they have become a terror to the Japanese who are being systematically blasted from their last remaining island strongholds guarding their homeland.

The lieutenant was graduated from Payette high school and then attended the College of Idaho for two and a half years. He was an assistant mortician with Peckhams chapel at Caldwell, Idaho, and then became a miner with the Bunker Hill and Sullivan Mine at Kellogg, Idaho.

Sailing for overseas duty on June 27, 1944, he has been flying combat missions with his squadron ever since.

Ensign George Woodrow Wren, 24, of Payette, will graduate from the Naval Reserve Officers Indocination school at Tucson, Arizona, with the 23rd battalion of this "Battleship of the Desert" Oct. 12, 1944, after completing 66 days of training in seamanship, navigation, ordnance and communications, the Eleventh Naval District announced today.

Designed to acquaint newly appointed officers with every possible element in Navy life, the school, under the command of Capt. M. E. Cheadle, USN (Ret.), specializes in visual training, teaching student officers naval subjects by actual practice, in addition to studying primary text books.

The course is supplemented with a rigorous physical education program designed to give the young

officers rugged bodies, fitting them for strenuous duties either ashore or afloat.

An engineer on the Alaska highway, a private in the army prior to entering the naval service, Wren attended the University of Idaho, receiving the degree of bachelor of science in civil engineering in 1942.

threatened," Stanton continued, "as evidenced by the statement recently by a national leader, who said newspapers should be made to follow the mandates of the sentiment of their readers." Under present conditions, he pointed out, the "press is not governed by license but by a high code of ethics of the profession."

"Newspapers' Community Asset" "Newspapers are a community asset, they are the eyes, ears and sometimes the nose of the community," Stanton said, "and the freedom of the press would be seriously challenged by the curtailment of advertising, which has been threatened by some high in government in the past." The community usually is judged by the newspaper that it produces, he continued and the editor is a civ-

ic jitterbug; he is constantly promoting community enterprise by getting behind the Chamber of Commerce, the churches and educational institutions; and assists in every way possible in building the community and bringing business to the town. The newspaper is a force for law and order and a real asset to the community in which it is published."
