

# FRUITLAND MAN CALLED BY DEATH

(Mrs. G. C. McGee, Fruitland cor.)  
 Grant Fisher was born at Noblesville, Ind., Dec. 30, 1863 and passed away at his home Oct. 7, 1944 at the age of 80 years, 9 mo. and 7 days. When three years of age he came with his parents to Nodaway county, Missouri, where they lived until 1882 and then moved to Rush, Kansas. In 1885 he was married to Nora Belle Nash. To this union three children were born. He returned with his family to Missouri in 1888, where his wife died six years later. In 1896 he was married to Lillie D. Chamberlain of Pickens, Mo. To this union six children were born. In 1908 he brought his family to Idaho, locating at Fruitland, where he has since lived. In his youth he was united with the Brethren Church and spent his life in the Christian service. Four children preceded him in death, Ethel, Lela, Glade and Kenneth. He is survived by his wife, Lillie Fisher, two sons, George, of Roswell, Earl, of Fruitland; three daughters, Mrs. Olive Eldredge, of Salmon; Mrs. Cecil Spencer, of Oakland, Cal.; and one sister, Mrs. Lola Kinison, of Pasadena, Cal.; two brothers, John, of Hopkins, Mo.; Hiram, of Waco, Texas and a half brother and two step sisters, Mrs. Fred Engle, of Payette, twelve grandchildren, four great grandchildren. Funeral services were held at the Brethren Church on Tuesday afternoon at two p. m. The H. B. Shank, of Notus officiating. He was laid to rest in the Riverside cemetery.

**S/S R. HODGES IN HOSPITAL OVERSEAS**

### U. S. WILL BUY 1944 WHEAT

The War Food Administration through the Commodity Credit Corporation will buy all unrefined 1944 crop wheat under loan May 1, 1944, at parity prices plus 1944 loan rates plus 15 cents a bushel less all carrying charges to the end of the storage year. In addition, Commodity Credit Corporation purchases prices for wheat in store in terminal and subterminal elevators, which is being acquired to meet feed wheat and

other government requirements will be advanced from time to time during the season.

 Corn ear worm is most troublesome from mid-August to the end of the sweet corn season. Most practical control method is injection of a small amount of refined mineral oil into the tip of each ear.
