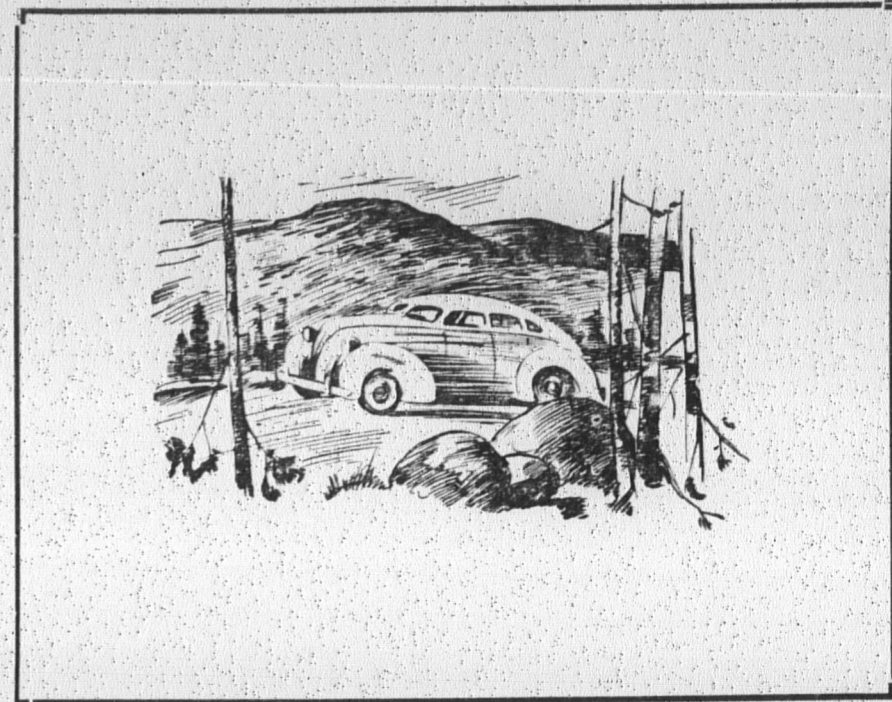
Mrs. Lyndori Fife and son Michael returned Sunday from several weeks' visiting her husband, Lyndon
