**Billy Beeson Writes Of Italy**

S. Sgt. Wm. R. Beeson, now in Italy, writes a most interesting letter describing conditions there, to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Beeson, of this city:

"Yes, we finally got the radio. It was all squashed up in shipment, but he had it rebuilt by the boys in the Signal Corps, and do we ever enjoy having it.

I gave a pint of blood to the British Red Cross. It didn't affect me in any way. I feel just as good as ever. All of the fellows in my squadron with "O" type blood each gave a pint.

Four of the boys in our outfit were awarded the Soldiers Medal. We had our squadron all out in full dress and passed in review for the colonel. They all looked very nice. It came off so good they let us off the rest of the afternoon, from 3 o'clock on.

"I can't send the 'Stars and Stripes' any more, don't know why, unless it's lack of shipping space.

"The farm houses are all built alike here, except the barn might be built on the right side instead of the left. The barn is the shed, attached to the side of the house. Looks like they have been built by Government housing project, because they are all alike and same size, have a plaque on the front with O. N. C. and a number below it. The numbers run like house numbers on a street. Close around here they have no wood, the houses are built of concrete with the roofs. They use coke to cook with and also to heat their irons. They use a hollow iron which they fill with hot coals, if they want the iron hotter, they step out into the street and swing the iron back and forth to fan it, until it gets hot enough, then they go back to their ironing.

"There are a few trees, around 1 1/2 feet in diameter, but in the mountains here, the timber is all some kind of hardwood scrub. Everything is built of cement and iron, mostly cement or rock walls and fences laid with cement.

"The weather has been stormy here, rainy and the wind is really doing its share.

"I was awful sorry to hear of Bob White's death, as I was in his class in Payette high school, all the four years. He was a swell kid.

"I got 3 Christmas packages the other day. The fruitcake from you, and one from my father-in-law were both molded and spoiled. He also sent some dates and they were in the same condition. A lot of the fellows have received boughten fruit cakes and they were all spoiled. They are pretty hard to send. The candy you sent came through very good though. I'm saving the things for Christmas. I sure got a bang out of the sagebrush you sent. I let all the boys from the West smell it, then I put a little on the stove and it went all through the build-

Cummings of New Plymouth and an instrument specialist in England, writes of the strenuous time schedule under which he is working, as follows: "I was going to wait until tomorrow and write you a nice long 'Happy Birthday' letter, but I'm not at all sure I'll have any time to write then, so I'm sending a brief one just in case I'm too busy to-

morrow. We've been putting in a 13 hour work day, 91 hour work week ever since I arrived in this hole a week ago. They tell us we have a job to do that calls for that many hours. I can't see it though, and I guess Gen. Wood can't either because he was here today and we got tonight off after only nine and one-half hours. If that's the reason we got off I hope he stays around for a while because we don't have time enough to eat and sleep on a schedule like that. I wonder how the strike artists at home would like to work on that kind of a deal? I'll bet if they'd do it we'd have had this war won by now. As it is, things are looking fairly good in France according to the papers. We got fairly good news on the invasion in Southern France considering that we have no radios or time to-

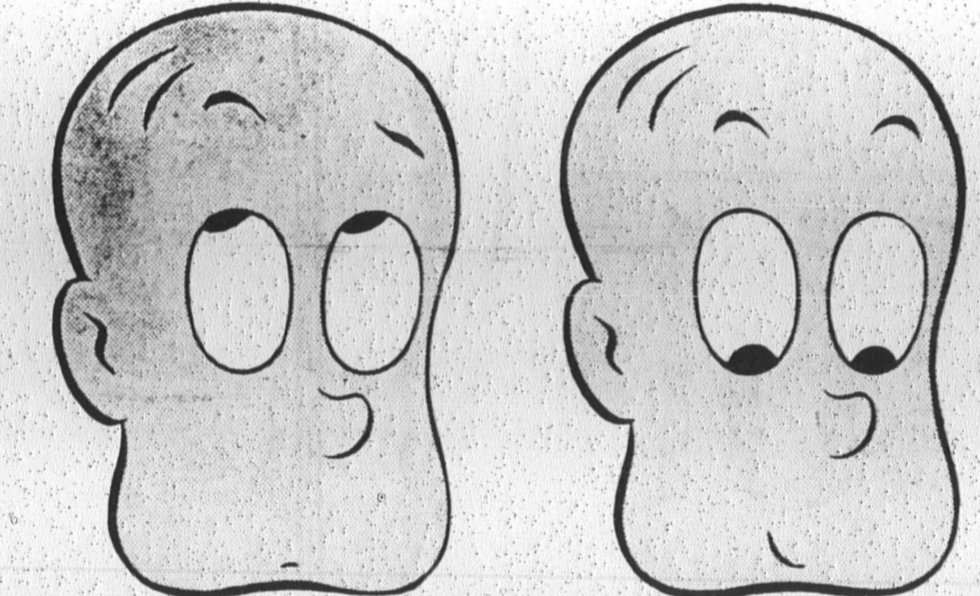

MEATS, FATS—Red stamps Q5 through S5, good thru Dec. 31. T5, U5, V5, W5 X5 become good Jan. 1.

PROCESSED FOODS—Blue stamps X, Y, Z3, A2 and B2 remain good until Dec. 31. C2, D2, E2, F2 and G2 become good Jan. 1.

SUGAR—Sugar Stamps 30, 31, 32 and 33, each good for five pounds indefinitely. Sugar Stamp 34 becomes good November 15 and remains good indefinitely. Sugar stamp 40 good for five pounds indefinitely.

SUGAR—Sugar stamp 34 good for five pounds indefinitely.

GASOLINE—A-13 coupons in New Ration Book good for four gallons through December 21.

FUEL OIL—Period 4 and 5 coupons from last heating season, and period 1 coupons from new heating season good throughout present heating year. Period 2 coupons good in Far West on December 11.

SHOES—Airplane stamps 1, 2, and 3 in Book Three, good indefinitely.
