ANY OF THIS \$25,000,000 YOURS?

There are approximately \$25,000,000 waiting to be picked up by some 30,000 veterans of the last war at the Veterans Administration if they will apply for it before the maturity date of their service certificates (Bonus), which in most cases is January 1, 1945. It is stated by Brig. Gen. Frank T. Hines, administrator of Veterans Affairs: All these veterans have to do to collect this money is to exercise their rights in connection with their adjusted service certificates. Some \$15,000,000 veterans can collect up to \$625 each, part of which is interest they are now being charged on loans and part interest they are being by not having applied for the bonds that were issued in exchange for certificates.
