Thirty Years Ago
The following items were taken from the Payette Enterprise, dated Feb. 18, 1915:

Judge Riebling states that on last Thursday evening he was awakened by an electric alarm which he has connected with his hen house, and grabbing his revolver went down to see what was going on and discovered the burglar hiding in a dark place. The burglar ran and Mr. Riebling states that he fired two shots but neither of them took effect.

The Hallowell Concert Co. which gave a concert at Payette last Thursday night under the auspices of the Payette band gave a good entertainment and had a good house but we believe that little if any of the proceeds were left for the band boys who were forced to guarantee a sum so large that the outsiders took all that was taken in.

Arthur Merritt and Harold Shake are working with the Idaho Power and Light Co's engineer force making the necessary surveys in this locality.

Gene Heath, the pioneer newspaperman, printer and wood cut artist of the Harney and Malheur counties of early days, and who published the Western Ways at Payette is now publishing the Saturday Mail at Ketchikan, Alaska.

Mr. and Mrs. Nova Lathrop recently returned from a visit to the Southland. They left the latter part of last November. Lathrop reports the finest kind of a time. Says hunting in Arkansas is excellent, deer, quail, ducks, geese and rabbits being abundant and some wild turkeys.

Twenty Years Ago

The following items were taken from the Payette Independent dated Feb. 12, 1925:

At the annual meeting of stockholders of the Farmers Co-operative Creamery at the Christian church last week, W. B. Wagner, manager, made his report of the business for the past year and the visitors present heard the best news since the organization of the creamery company, and a report which ought to be especially pleasing to every citizen of Payette county. The report showed a gain over the previous year of 731,700 pounds of butter manufactured, or approximately 64 per cent.

The resignation of Rev. Henry Pacobs, who has been pastor of the First Baptist Church of New Plymouth, is regretted by many of the members and friends. Mr. Jacobs will establish his home in Salt Lake where he has formerly been a resident.

It is with pleasure that we report the news that Edward Equals, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Equals, won the honors for the first semester at the State University with an A grade for every study. Edward carried off high honors in the Payette high school and is pleasing to his friends to know that he is able to continue his leadership in the larger institution of learning.

The following items were taken from the Payette Independent, dated Feb. 17, 1905:

Mrs. Rosa Schmidt, whose homestead was contested about three years ago by David Barclay, has received word from H. E. Wallace, her

attorney at Caldwell, that the secretary of the interior at Washington, D. C. has confirmed all previous decisions sustaining her right to the homestead, which is located between Payette and New Plymouth and is probably worth \$8,000 to \$10,000.

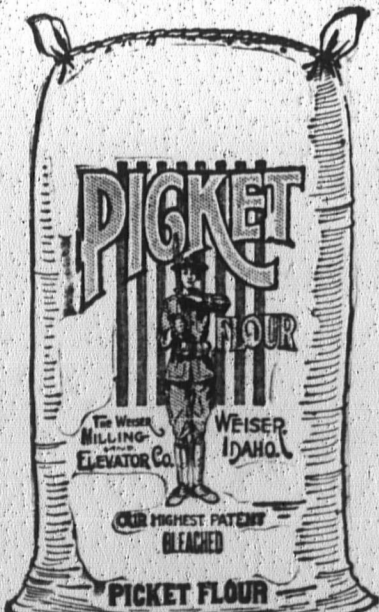
