So we should really get filled up for a change. I got a break yesterday, there was three of us from the battalion got to go in and make a recording to send to the states for broadcast. In case you don't hear it you can write to Boise or Salt Lake and get a record made to play on the phonograph."

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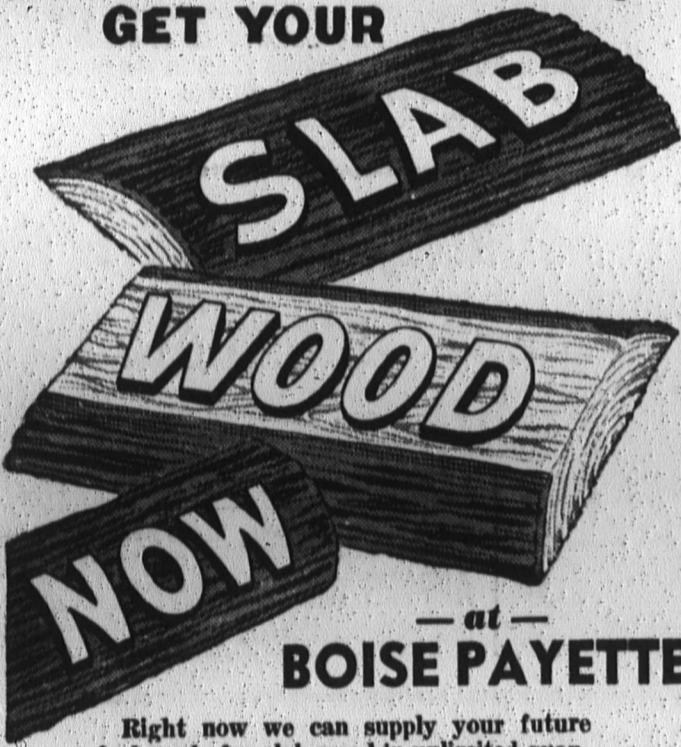
