SHEEPMEN WILL MEET AT WEISER

Plan District Organization To Fight Predatory Animals

Sheepmen of six counties will meet at Weiser, May 9th at 10 a. m. to discuss and lay plans to coordinate predatory animal work of their area into a uniform program.

In view of the recent action of the State Game Department in setting a \$5 bounty on coyotes, cats and lynx and a \$3 bounty on pups, sheepmen state they must reorganize their programs. To harmonize all methods of predatory destruction it is very necessary activities be correlated into a year around program.

In calling the meeting sheepmen in the counties of Adams, Washington, Valley, Gem, Payette and that portion of Canyon north of Boise river plan to unite as a district in order to promote an efficient uniform program.

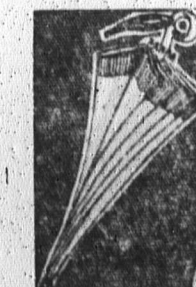
