

Stanton Describes Early School Busses Used On Run To Payette

The Stanton Transfer company which has operated the bus service for School District No. 32 for the past quarter of a century, has notified the board of trustees that it will not continue that service. It is understood that plans are under way by the board to purchase busses and handles its own transportation system.

Fred Stanton who has driven at times during the entire 25 years, recalls some interesting facts about the bus operation. He says:

For the first few years flat bed trucks were used. These all purpose vehicles were busy during the day hauling livestock, grain, and other commodities. They were equipped with removable tops which were hastily lifted on and off before and after each school run. The seats were wooden benches put on and off with the canvas covered tops. Around the sides was a woven wire screen to keep the youngsters from falling out. The entrance was by back steps through a rear door. There were no cushions on the seats, the springs under the busses were truck type which with the unimproved roads made them plenty rough riding. The canvas tops did not keep the cold out very well during the frosty wintry days and many times in spite of warm clothing, overcoats, stockings and long handled underwear, some of the little fellows would be crying when they arrived at school.

The first glassed in bus was put in service in the season of 1923-24. It was a 40 passenger with cushioned seats. This was also a truck chassis and was plenty rough riding, but was considered one of the most up-to-date busses then hauling school children in the state. From then on rural school children of the district enjoyed riding to and from school in as modern trucks as were available.

Before motor trucks were used, many residents north and south of town will remember the old horse drawn vehicles. Some of those who operated such busses for the district are N. M. Jensen, E. E. Parsons (father of Ed), A. J. Shearer and Mr. Bartenhagen. It will be recalled that the first children to get on these wagons were as much as an hour and a half in getting to school.

In a few instances members of families of two generations have been transported to and from school by the Stanton busses. Ed Parsons, now a member of the school board and his sisters Katherine (Davis), and Edna (Horton) were school bus patrons part of their school terms. Ed's little son and daughter have ridden to and from school part of the time in the last three years. Others who now have boys and girls transported by bus who themselves used this service of transportation are M. W. Oster, Mrs. C. T. Clauser, Mrs. Melvin Dean and others. There are several who rode the busses during their entire school course, a few such that can be recalled are Mary Jane Moggridge Lee, Jack Moggridge and Darlene and Lucille Lake.

Many interesting experiences could be related by former drivers, a few of whom are James W. Stanton, Miles Parson, Garland Walters, Russell Thistle and Clarence Brubaker.

Mr. Stanton praised highly the excellent cooperation received from the parents on the routes during the entire time he and his brother operated the busses.

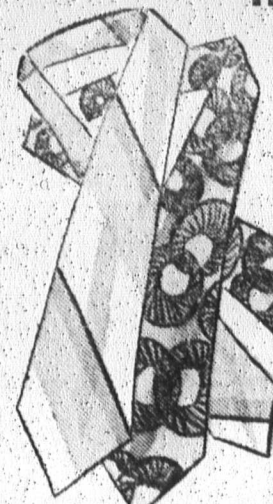

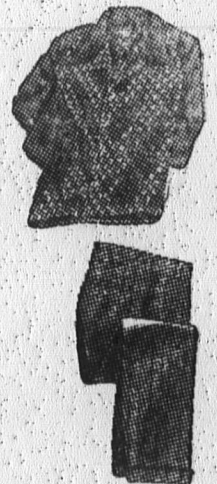
