Cpl. Gardner At Great Bend Field

GREAT BEND ARMY AIR FIELD, June 15—Corporal Frank B. Gardner, son of Mr. Amos A. Gardner, Boise, is now located at the Great Bend (Kansas) Army Air Field where he is an aerial radio operator on a combat crew in a bombardment group stationed at that B-29 operational training base of the Second Air Force. Upon completion of his training, he will proceed overseas to a combat area with his group to do his part in defeating the enemy.

Prior to entrance into military service in March, 1944, Cpl. Gardner was a laundry machine operator for the Troy Laundry Co., Boise. He is a graduate (1937) of the Fruitland high school.

His wife, the former Mildred Manis, and their three children, reside at Payette.
