Stearns of Washoe, recently received a cable from their son, Captain Thornton Stearns who is stationed in England stating he was married at a single ring ceremony June 29 to Miss Marta Platowska of Czechoslovakia. The wedding took place at Walter Norfolk county. Many of the men and officers at his post, were guests. The bride was lovely in Parisian ensemble of navy blue with matching hat and accessories. She wore a corsage of white lilies. Immediately after the ceremony a large reception was given by the officers and men of the 359th Fighter Group, and was held at Thetford, England after which the couple went on a short honeymoon to London. Mrs. Stearns has been connected with the Czechoslovakian Embassy since its removal to London just before the Germans occupied the country. That was about five years ago. The legation has been moved to Paris where the main work is getting liberated people located in their own homes again. Captain Stearns is a graduate of the Nampa high school and of the College of Idaho. He has been in the Armed forces for about thirty-eight months, twenty-one of which he spent in England. He is now in the Administrative Department and is in charge of the educational project for men of the troops of occupation of his group of the 359th.

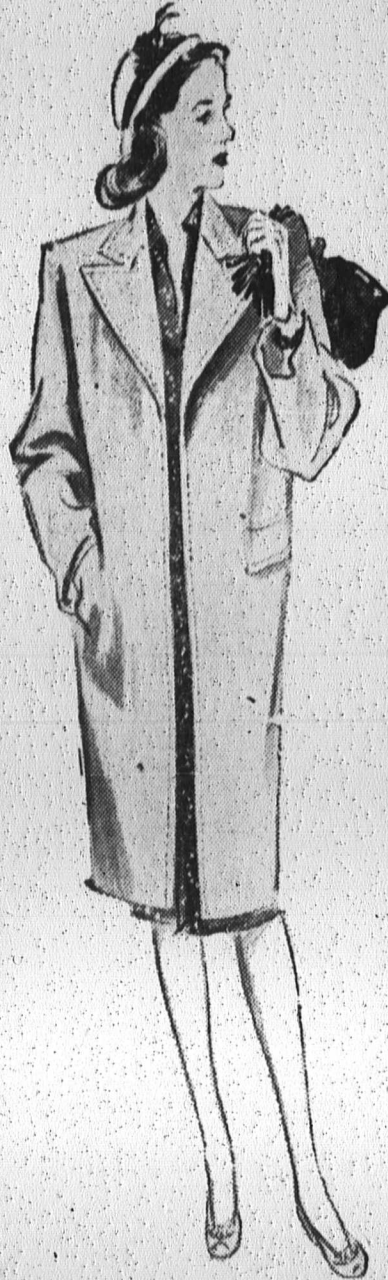
