A fire at the noon hour Tuesday destroyed the Charles Stockham house at Falk. Origin, it is believed, was from sparks from the chimney as the roof was ablaze when discovered by Mrs. Stockham. The fire siren was sounded and many men went out to help the neighbors already there. The piano and some other pieces of furniture on the lower floor and some clothing and bedding were saved. The house was a huge structure of ten rooms and was built in 1893 by Capt. Wm. Stuart who homesteaded the land in the '80's and raised a family of nine children. He died in 1895 and the place passed into the hands of his son Wm., father of Mrs. Brady Harris. The property changed hands many times and had several renters until 1939 when the Stockhams purchased the farm from J. R. Ilett. He had recently installed a pressure system and made other improvements. There was insurance and rebuilding will soon be underway.

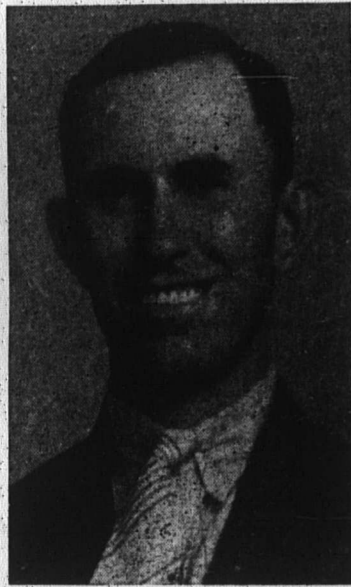
