To show this type of game only two punts were made during the game. Payette made ten first downs to Emmett's six.

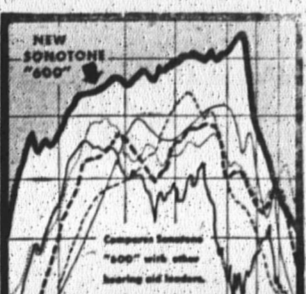
