The attending physician reported that he was unable to get his patient into the local hospital due to overcrowded conditions, and was therefore forced to attempt to get Mrs. Blank to the other hospital. He accompanied her in the ambulance but despite his ministrations death came. A grief-stricken husband and two minor children survive.

The foregoing is a pure figment of the imagination to show what could happen in Payette and to impress upon the citizens of the community the dire need for expanded hospital facilities.

Hospital facilities and medical care are fundamental services that every community should provide. Without them, one might just as well live on a barren desert miles away from everything and everybody.

Like Great Oaks from Little Acorns, Big News Stories from Rumors Grow

The biggest news of a week is sometimes a rumor. This is especially true in communities of average size, where persons usually know considerably about their neighbors' businesses.

The friendly folks who give tips to news reporters are sometimes nonplused because it is occasionally several weeks before stories that are common knowledge get the recognition of appearing in print. This brings up the questions: why are rumors disregarded as news and when does a rumor become news?

Suppose a board or a council or commission holds one or more special sessions at which some extraordinary action is taken, policy approved or decision arrived at. Perhaps when the official responsible for giving news releases is contacted by reporters he may decide that it is to the best interests of the council, board or commission if no publicity is received until developments are in a more advanced stage. Sometimes the official will say "no news today" or even "no news this week."

When this happens a news reporter has two courses open: he may go to other than official sources, get as much information as possible and print the rumor as a rumor. Or he may wait until the board, commission or council reporter decides that since a matter has become general knowledge it is safe to let the main facts be published,

Most conscientious and careful newsmen decide to publish facts only after their approval and release by official sources. But a reporter never overlooks a truism that biggest stories from little rumors grow. And news gatherers are eternally grateful to the kindly folks, who in the course of a friendly few words, give the invaluable tips for stories. Say, have you heard" or "You know that if you'd ask John Jones about" ... And sooner or later these advance notices blossom into front page news reports.—Gooding Leader...


