The past week has been a busy one for Probate Judge Martin Luther, who acts in the capacity of probate judge as well as city police judge. Following a quiet New Year's several infractions were reported during the forepart of the past week as follows:

Fine And Jail Sentence
Carl L. Leuz was arrested by Sheriff Harold Gurnsey on a charge of being drunk in a public place on December 21st. Leuz appeared before Judge Luther on Monday and after entering a plea of guilty was fined \$25 and given thirty days in the Payette county jail.

Traffic Violation
Emory Galkins entered a plea of guilty to a traffic violation on Tuesday and was fined two dollars. Galkins was arrested by Night Officer Huff after he had driven in the middle of a block in the business district.

Fined On Check Charge
William Pele of New Plymouth entered a plea of guilty to a charge of issuing a check without sufficient funds on Wednesday of this week. Pele was fined \$25 and costs. He was arrested following the filing of a complaint by Walter Overlander. The complaint charged that Pele issued a check in the amount of \$17.36 which was passed at the office of the Van Patten Lumber Co.

Juveniles Appear
Four girls ranging from ten to fifteen years of age, together with their parents, were brought before Probate Judge Martin Luther on Monday on a charge of curfew violation. The girls were charged with being on the streets at two o'clock in the morning. Judge Luther explained the curfew and then turned to the youngsters and their parents and emphasized the fact that the parents are held accountable under the law.

Payette County Again Over Top
Payette county may again take pride in the fact that another War Bond quota has been over subscribed. According to an announcement this week by Col. W. H. Moss, War Finance committee chairman, Payette county residents purchased war bonds in the amount of \$26,077.75 while the December quota stood at \$26,000. Local Schools Reopen Monday
Attendance Does Not Indicate That Flu Has Hit Large Majority

Payette youngsters rather reluctantly responded to the school opening on Monday of this week following a ten day vacation over the holiday season. Attendance records at the three schools do not indicate that the epidemic of flu has particularly hit local students.

According to figures supplied by the Independent Enterprise on Monday of this week by school authorities, the school at the beginning of the year reached just about the figure of the schools during the past year, with the exception of the South Payette school which had a slightly higher enrollment.

There are no students enrolled in the local high school on the closing day of the vacation. The week of absence from school was estimated to be about 100 days.

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Seventy Registrants Re-classified; Many Married Men Are In January Quota

Thirty-eight Payette county men will report for induction in the armed forces on January 27th, according to an announcement made recently by the Payette county selective service board. It is estimated that fully half of the January quota will be composed of married men; the greater portion being married men with children. The names of those who will report this month have not as yet been compiled.

Eastman Raises Registered Pigs
Nucleus Of Large Herd Of Hereford Hogs Started Recently

Jason's Ladd II is the head man at the Bernard Eastman herd of registered Hereford hogs at his place located on the Black Canyon project on the Fruitland-Nyas highway. Eastman recently acquired this registered herd of a sale of 10 Hereford hogs at the Marion county fair grounds at Klamath and the herd that Eastman purchased topped the sale.

Eastman's herd of registered Hereford hogs will prove a valuable addition to Payette county's hog industry. The Hereford is a fairly new breed of hogs which are unusually prolific. Two girls in the Eastman herd recently produced a litter of ten and the other eleven. It is claimed that hogs of this breed can be developed to weigh from 240 to 260 pounds within a period of thirty to forty days less time than is the case with other well known breeds and the animals dress out at least five per cent better than others.

Eastman is planning on the development of quite a herd of Hereford hogs at his New Plymouth farm and at the present time is engaged in the building of six electric brooder houses for hogs. The houses are built on the same principle as those used for poultry and through the artificial heating will be able to raise two litters annually.

The Eastman herd of Hereford hogs is the only one in Payette county and is the second in the state of Idaho.

FORGER IS GIVEN TERM IN PRISON

M. G. Huber Sentenced To Term In Idaho State Prison

After entering a plea of guilty to a charge of forgery, M. G. Huber was sentenced to a term of one to four years in the Idaho state prison by District Judge A. O. Sutton on Monday of this week. Huber pleaded guilty to a charge of having forged the name of C. D. Marshall to a check in the amount of \$22 which was cashed by S. L. Langford of the Commercial hotel. He had been up on a similar charge in this county previously and is reported to have had a police record in all states.

Huber waived his right to an attorney and asked for the mercy of the court at the time that he was sentenced. "I have been in the army and there we don't make excuses, documented or are against me. I don't want to fight the case and so to speak, why sentence should not be pronounced now and have it over with," the accused man told Judge Sutton when asked if there was any reason why sentence should not be pronounced at that time. "I would like a parole if possible," he continued, "as I have a wife and an eleven year old girl and the child does need my attention. However, I do not know any one here in whose custody I might be put."

Huber stated that he was 32 years of age and had served three years in the United States army, previous to the present war. He enlisted in Vancouver, Washington and served something at that place. He stated that he was a native of Canada and had lived in the vicinity of Walla Walla, Washington for a period of approximately twenty years.
