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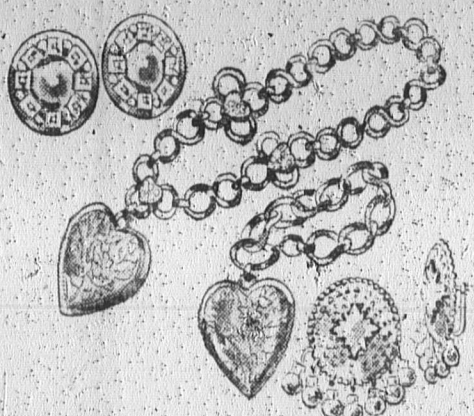

Tentative acreage goals for crops and percentage of increase or decrease for livestock and livestock products for Payette county were received from the state AAA committee last week. County production goals for 1944 crops soon will be established and committees will begin the job of contacting farmers and ranchers in the county to work out individual goals for next year's war food production. County goals will follow state goals of increased production for practically all crops, milk and eggs and decreases in practically all other livestock products. However, production resources of the county will be taken into consideration in deciding what the county's share of the goals for the various crops and livestock products will be.
