Former Resident Dies In Portland

E. J. Peacore, former resident of Payette, passed away suddenly in Portland following a heart attack last Sunday night. Accompanied by Mrs. Peacore the body was brought to Payette and funeral services were held this Thursday afternoon at Landon's Funeral home with Rev. Cecil Hannan in charge.

Edward Joseph Peacore was born in Chippewa Falls, Wisconsin, April 14, 1877, the son of Scraper and Mary Peacore. He later graduated from the Tomah, Wis. business school and entered the employ of the U. S. Indian Service and served as a teacher, engineer and disciplinarian in the Tomah Indian School for a period of twelve years. He held principalships in Indian schools at Wyandotte, Okla.; Brown, Mont.; and Rosebud, S. D. He served as agency superintendent at Ft. Defiance, Ariz., and the Consolidated Southern Use Indian Reservation for sections of Utah and Colorado. Mr. Peacore was with the Ft. Berthold Agency in North Dakota until his retirement.

Deceased was a member of the Masonic Order, and also of the Methodist church. He was a veteran of the Spanish-American war. Deceased was married Feb. 28, 1934 to Florence Jasperson at Sturgis, S. D., and besides his widow is survived by two sons, Edward, Jr., and George. Mr. and Mrs. Peacore came to Payette in 1940 and left last March for Portland, where he had been engaged in defense work. He was in Payette last week looking for property which he hoped to purchase and to return to this community to make his future home.

Faces Charge In Probate Court

George M. Glascock, of Washington county, appeared in the probate court on Monday of this week and entered a plea of not guilty to a charge of operating a motor vehicle after his driver's license had been revoked. The trial was set for March 8 and Glascock was released under a \$150 bond. Stewart; four daughters, Velma, Mrs. Joe Baker, of Teldrana, Calif.; Delphine, Mrs. Edward Coles, of Tacoma, Washington; Alta, Mrs. Walter Snyder, of Hermiston, Oregon; and Ruth Gloria, Mrs. James Moore, of Pasadena, California; her parents of this city, and three sisters, Mrs. Maude Grogan of Payette; Mrs. Ruth Evans of Yakima, Washington; and Mrs. Wm. WAC TRAINING PROVES ATTRACTIVE

Lt. Margaret Murray and Pfc. Dorothy Keller, were Payette visitors on Monday of this week and spoke before the ladies of Portland club. Both are recruiting officers for the WACs and Lt. Murray de-

scribed the life in the WAC and the Army Air corps. The recruit goes to Boise for mental and physical exams and from there is sent either to Des Moines, Iowa or Ft. Oglethorpe, Ga., for five weeks of basic training. Following the completion of the training the WAC is then sent to an army air base or post of her choosing. Different lines of work available consist of radio, administrative, photography, Link trainer, instructor, airplane mechanic, ambulance drivers. Overseas duty is optional. Recruits are acceptable between the ages of 20 and 50 years and pay ranges from \$50 to \$333 per month.
