MUST ONE BE A MEMBER OF THE CHURCH TO BE SAVED?

From this we see that Christ is the saviour of A BODY; but just what is that body? "And he is the head of THE BODY, THE CHURCH"—Col. 1:18. Then am I safe in saying that Christ is the saviour of the body, the church? No one will question that. In order to get into this body, the church, there must be an entrance. 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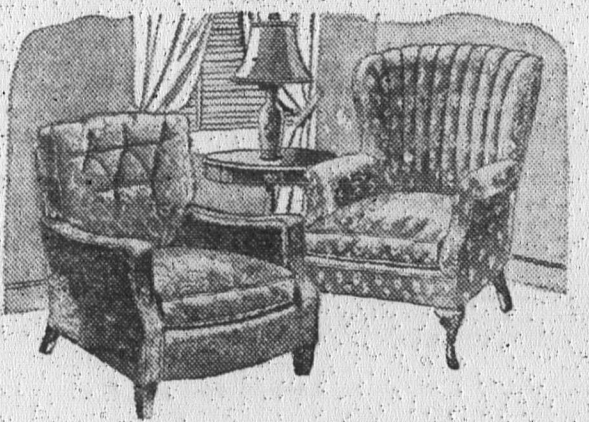

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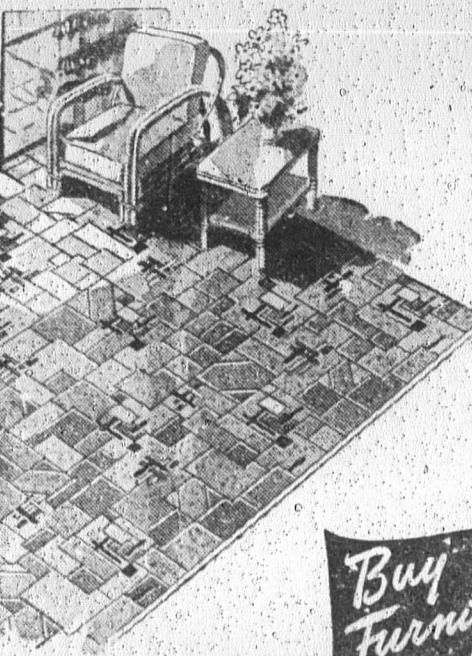


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
