Pressure Cookers To Be Tested

Arrangements have been made with Mrs. Allie Conway, Glynn's home demonstration agent, to test pressure cookers for Payette county housewives for accuracy, for pressure, etc. Anyone wishing to have a cooker tested may bring it to the Idaho Power offices either in Payette or New Plymouth. Before bringing the cookers in it is absolutely necessary that all parts be thoroughly cleaned in the following manner:

Use hot sudsy water for the kettle.

Wipe the lid with soapy cloth but do not immerse in water as this may affect the gauge.

Clean edges of kettle and cover thoroughly as dried food, dirt or scale from hard water may prevent a tight seal and allow steam to leak.

Clean the opening with a toothpick or other small sharp-pointed tool.

Clean petcock and safety valve by drawing a string or narrow strip of cloth thru them and then remove the petcock and safety valve and soak in vinegar for a short time.

Unscrew ball and socket type of safety valve and clean with polish the ball and socket into which it fits.

Steigerwalt Helps Knock Out Axis

15TH ARMY AIR FORCE—Cpl. Victor Steigerwalt, Payette, Idaho, isn't a pilot or a gunner, but the machine guns and cannons he maintains have scored heavily against the Axis. An aviator in a famed squadron in a fighter group in the Mediterranean theater of operations, Cpl. Steigerwalt's death dealing guns have knocked down seven and damaged many additional Axis aircraft.

Pilots who fly the single-seater P-38 Lightning on which he is the armament mechanic have learned to depend on his guns firing when over an enemy plane flies through

its sights. A dependable, confident aviator, he has won the respect of his pilots and fellow enlisted men.

The group of which he is a member has shot down over 350 enemy aircraft during the less than 15 months it has been in combat service. Lt. Col. William P. Patton, Miss, is the group commanding officer.
