Potato Seed Piece Handling

There are several things that should be kept in mind in handling seed potato pieces:

1. Seed in a cold storage should have a warming-up period of two or three weeks.

2. Cut seed should not be exposed to drying conditions, either during cutting or while being held before planting. Seed should be cut in a cellar and held there until planting time.

3. Keep seed covered with canvas while hauling it to the field.

It has been found in tests made in both Idaho and Maine that seed pieces weighing around two ounces gave the largest yield per acre.

MEATS-FATS REQUIRING RED POINTS

The only items for which red points will be needed are beef steaks (except flank steaks), roasts, butter, margarine, cheese, cheese products and evaporated milk, the Office of Price Administration announced. Three red stamps (30 points) will become valid every four weeks instead of every two
