

## TUESDAY MORNING'S FROST DOES DAMAGE TO COUNTY'S FRUIT CROP

Full Amount Of Damage To Apples And Prunes Not Evident For Several Days

The fruit sections of Payette county report losses of the fruit crop as a result of temperatures ranging as low as 25 degrees last Tuesday morning. The losses in apples and prunes throughout the section were reported as spotted and the orchards on higher ground reporting less damage than those in the lower sections. A survey was conducted on Wednesday of this week by the Independent-Enterprise and it seemed to be the consensus of opinion that it was really too early to estimate damage but some orchardists were quite definite in their statement that they suffered fully fifty percent loss. The heavy stand of both apples and prunes, however, relieved the situation to some extent and some of the growers were of the opinion that the freeze had been beneficial by aiding in their thinning operations. However, it is conceded that although there will no doubt be some loss in the quality of the fruit, together with the high prevailing prices will no doubt compensate to some extent.

Considerable damage was reported to smaller gardens as well as potatoes, and slight damage to corn in some instances.

F. H. Hogue stated on Wednesday that the damage was quite spottet but that in all cases the fruit trees were heavily overloaded and will doubtless "carry" as much of a crop as they should, although there were unquestionably losses in some instances. The heaviest damage was in the section north of Payette and at Crystal. Mr. Hogue is of the opinion that there will be near a normal crop of prunes taking the situation as a whole. He estimates that the loss in the Homedale, Payette, Emmett and Mesa districts may amount to approximately 500 cars. He reports that no damage was done at his cherry orchard due to the fact that smudge pots were kept going throughout the damage period.

J. C. Palumbo made a survey of his orchards Wednesday afternoon and although it is early to give a correct estimate he figures that he may suffer a possible fifty percent loss. Palumbo has a 25 acre orchard near the desert south of New Plymouth and damage in that section was heavy. Another 10 acre orchard some one and one-half miles distant was slightly damaged. Palumbo is of the opinion that orchards having had proper care thus far during the season did not suffer great damage.

From the Ray Shurtliff farm north of Payette comes word to the effect that while there has been some damage to apples and prunes it will require several days to give a fair estimate as to the amount of damage done by the

This Payette County Labor association received twenty-five Mexican at the Ontario CCC camp Tuesday, May 18, and they were all put to work Thursday, May 18, and have continued to work one hundred percent up to date. At the present time, there have been more calls for labor than can be filled. It is expected that from 125 to 250 will be housed at the Gala Gardens camp at the Ontario-Payette junction by June 1st, this depending of course upon the amount of fruit production in this area Monday night freeze.

Labor needs may either be called into the county agent's office at Payette or at the CCC camp at Ontario, phone 424-44 until June 1st. After this date, it must be planned into the labor camp at Gala Gardens.

It is anticipated there will be ample labor to take care of all needs. Ninety boys and girls at the Payette high school have registered for all types of farm and harvest work.

At a meeting of the board of directors of the association, it was determined that all employers must carry insurance. They may either carry it themselves or it may be carried through the association.

"Whereas, the United States of America is again being offered to crush powerful enemies seeking to establish their tyranny over the world; and

"Whereas, the young men of Payette again are offering their lives in the nation's service, and

"Whereas, the memory of those who have given their lives is cherished by us all and is an inspiration to us all in these grave days; and

"Whereas, their service and sacrifice is symbolized by the memorial poppy of the American Legion and American Legion auxiliary, now therefore

"I, J. A. McMillan, Mayor of the City of Payette, do hereby proclaim Saturday, May 27, 1944, to be Poppy Day in the City of Payette, and urge all citizens to observe the day by wearing the memorial poppy in honor of the men who died for America in the battles of World War I and World War II."

## POPPY DAY ON NEXT SATURDAY

### Oliver Stegall Is Recovering

Mr. and Mrs. Allen Stegall received a letter from their son, Oliver, on Wednesday of this week, written May 7. "Can't write much but am O. K. I had two rifle slugs in my left leg and arm but could have been much worse. I may have a bad ankle but nothing to worry about. Be shipping home soon now. Must quit as I am not too comfortable." On Thursday of last week the Stegalls received a cable from the War Department informing them that their son had been seriously wounded in battle in New Guinea. On Tuesday of this week another letter from the government was received informing them of his temporary address which is Captain Oliver M. Stegall, (032556) Hospital, Central Directory, A.P.O. 501, in care of the postmaster at San Francisco. Captain Stegall has been in the South Pacific area for more than two years.

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The first fire of the past week was on Friday at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Ellis Harley. A cooking utensil had been left on a stove and considerable smoke resulted which brought the alarm. Aside from some smoke damage there was no loss.

Saturday the department was called to the H. N. Baker residence on South Ninth street where a spark from a chimney had started a roof fire. It is estimated that the damage will total approximately \$150, partially due to water used in extinguishing the blaze.

The fire department was called to the George Thebo residence on Sixth street on Monday to extinguish trash fire which had spread into a nearby woodpile and threatened the house. The blaze was soon extinguished not until however some wood had been destroyed.

They made their home in Fairfield until 1933 when the family moved to Payette. Deceased is survived by two sons, Seth W. J. of Payette and Hubert A. of Salem, Oregon, and two grandchildren, Freida, of Salem and Seth, who is serving in the armed forces in England.

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
