

## Wegener Issues Call To Action

In a call to action on the eve of the Fifth War Loan, Theo H. Wegener, War Finance state executive manager, issued a statewide appeal today to both War Bond workers and War Bond buyers.

"We are launching the Fifth War Loan campaign," said Wegener, "at the most crucial period of our nation's history. America and her allies are pausing momentarily at the brink of all-out invasion such as this world has never seen before."

"Our boys overseas... our own sons, brothers, fathers, sweethearts... need your monetary support now more than ever before. And they need your moral support too. They need to know that all of us at home are making every possible sacrifice to help them. That means that each of us... individual salesman or buyers, corporation, city, county, state... must make his Fifth War Loan quota."

"We must both sell and buy more War Bonds than before. More than before must be much more than just a slogan. It must be a determined resolution to action and sacrifice on the part of every Idahoan. Now, more than ever before, it is vital that Idaho make her War Loan quota."

In making a dramatic comparison between sacrifices on the home front and sacrifices on the battle front, Wegener stressed, "Our boys overseas may not come back, but our War Bonds will."

## Grimes Takes Part In Anzio Play

## Crew Member Of "Memphis Belle"

AN 8th AF BOMBER STATION, England—When the "Memphis Belle" left this field last summer on its homeward mission, Staff Sgt. John H. Tabb, son of Mrs. Mary E. Milnor, Rt. 1, Payette, Idaho, was down on the line for the take-off, and thought he had seen the last of the famous Flying Fortress. Recently, "Memphis Belle" returned to Sergeant Tabb's heavy bomber base in England in the form of the European premiere of the War Department's techni-

color motion picture. "Just one plane... and one crew... in one squadron... in one group... of one wing... of the air force... out of fifteen United States Army air forces..." said the narrator, but to John Tabb and hundreds of men in his outfit, now almost two years overseas, it was like greeting an old friend returned. The "Memphis Belle" had belonged to them.

They were the ground crews, mechanics, clerks, cooks, technicians and medics who stayed at their jobs so more flying Fortresses could strike out against Hitler. As one armament man put it, "I loaded many a bomb in that baby! That's why Sergeant Tabb and men of his outfit were first in England to see the picture."

The sergeant's job with this pioneer bomber group is handling salvage of clothing and other material for a quartermaster company. Prior to entering the Army Air Forces, he was employed on highway construction.

He received his education at Saratoga, Tex., high school. He has a brother, Carroll, in the U. S. Navy.

## Robt. M. Woodward Promoted Recently

ADVANCED 5th AIR FORCE BASE—Tech. Sergeant, Robert M. Woodward, son of Mr. and Mrs. F. S. Woodward, 1934 "B" Avenue, National City, California, was promoted recently to master sergeant.

Sgt. Woodward is flight chief of B-24 type airplanes and is with the "Dumbos"—a combat mapping unit stationed at an advanced 5th Air Force base in New Guinea.

After his induction into the army at Ft. Douglas, Utah, on March 17, 1942, Sgt. Woodward was sent to the Army Air Forces' Air Mechanic school at Sheppard Field, Texas. Upon graduation as an air mechanic, he was assigned to Peterson Field, Colo. In July, 1943 Sgt. Woodward was appointed flight chief and received specialized training at the Consolidated Aircraft Co., San Diego, Calif.

Sgt. Woodward has been overseas since March, 1944.

## Container Shortage Now Severe

V. A. Siple, Payette county extension agent, urged growers, shippers and wholesalers to watch their use of wooden containers, new and used, as the supply this year may be less than 1943 which in some cases was inadequate.

The W.F.A. has placed quotas on wooden containers, restricting their use effective July 1, 1944. Previously, W.F.A. had announced restrictions on wooden containers but the deadline was postponed as the situation eased through the winter. They now definitely state

that June 30 will be the last day on which wooden containers can be used without restriction, according to V. A. Siple.

The only bright part of the situation is that quotas are based on container use of 1943. This will allow more packages than last year. Production of fresh fruits and vegetables was less in 1943 as compared with 1942. This year production estimates show a 15 per cent increase making considerable more containers necessary, he said.

W.F.A. has ordered that 80 per cent of 1942 use will be available for lettuce and celery; 100 per cent of 1942 use, available for carrots. No quota has been set on baskets, but they are expected to be restricted. Quotas are based on use of new and old wooden containers, Siple continued.

## Egg Support Price Continued

Programs to maintain an average price to farmers of 27 cents a dozen for ruin-of-the-nest eggs will be continued through cooperation between egg handlers, egg processors and the War Food Administration, WFA has announced. Arrangements between "assemblers" with contracts with WFA and grocery stores and other local egg receivers have resulted in support prices in most localities in the state. Shortage of egg cases, however, is "plaguing" the collection program to some extent, and some localities have not been included in the program yet. WFA last week announced that more than 160,000 cases of eggs are being cracked and frozen weekly, and that some eggs will be converted to animal feed to maintain the support price program even though storage facilities for keeping eggs for human consumption have been filled temporarily.

## COUNTRY DEPOSITS UP 137 PERCENT

Demand deposits in country banks (consisting largely of ordinary checking accounts) increased 137 percent from 1940 to April,

1944, according to the Bureau of Agricultural Economics. Such an increasing body of idle funds, more than twice that of four years ago, could cause inflationary trouble if country depositors began using their funds to bid against each other for the purchase of land at increasing prices. BAE advises, "At ready hand values have risen almost two-fifths above their pre-war average, an increase that is inflationary in many areas. Further, more in some of the principal farming areas the volume of land

has never reached as high as it reached in 1914 and the number of farms resold after only a short period of ownership increased. Following the inflation of land values during the last war, land prices broke sharply in 1920.

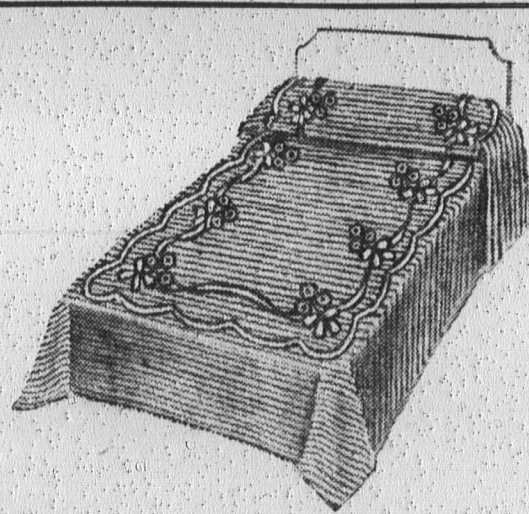

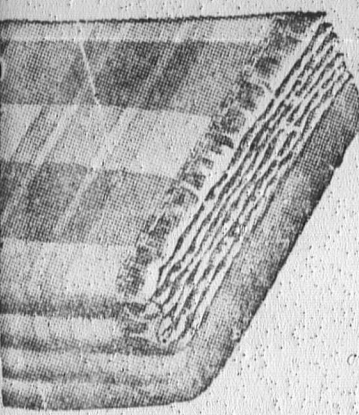
