WAR BOND SALES FAR FROM GOAL

Bonds Purchased Up Until Wednesday Far Below County Quota

Compilation of figures on war bond purchases in Payette county made by Keith Anderson, secretary of the Payette Chamber of Commerce on Wednesday evening of this week indicated that up until that time Payette county is far short of the \$400,000 which must be raised by July 8th. Considerable effort is being put behind the campaign by the Payette County Victory Crew in order that the county may be able to maintain that enviable reputation of having met every war-time demand thus far.

Purchases of bonds of all types on Wednesday evening totalled \$163,977.50.

A quota of \$400,000 in E Bonds has been set for Payette county and purchases to date of this type bond total only \$103,800. Other bonds purchased in the county to date \$30,177.50 while the quota stands at \$296,200.

Purchases in the various communities of the county up until Wednesday showed that residents of Payette had purchased War Bonds in the amount of \$95,280. New Plymouth \$30,559.50 and Fruitland \$8,187.50.

Reports from Victory Crew members are to the effect that the canvass of the New Plymouth section has been approximately ninety percent completed.

Payette county democratic and republican precinct committees met in conformity with the state law at the Payette county court house last Saturday. Both parties organized and elected officers for the ensuing two years.

Frank West succeeds himself as Republican county chairman and will be assisted by Keith Anderson, as secretary-treasurer. Mrs. Violet Munser was selected as state committeewoman and George Wisner, state committeeman.

Ed Meroney was appointed as a precinct committeeman from the West Black Canyon precinct.

H. S. "Ski" Harper was named as chairman of the Payette county Democratic Central Committee and Mrs. May Wicks was elected as secretary-treasurer. Harper succeeds Bill McEachan as chairman. McEachan resigned the position as he was nominated by the democrats for state representative. A. G. Brown was named state committeeman and Mrs. Nellie Legan was selected as state committeewoman.

Registration is again open for those voters who did not vote in the last general election or who have established their residence in the county since the last election. Registrars are now active in each voting precinct.

The state platform convention is scheduled to meet at least sixteen days following the nominating election.

Ski is the last day upon which candidates at the nominating election may file their expense accounts with the county auditor.

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
