Government Offers Aid To Veterans

General eligibility requirements on the part of receiving world war veterans who wish Farm Security Administration (FSA) assistance in the purchase of a farm, have been outlined by the county FSA administrator, Stanley P. Swenson, county FSA supervisor, Federal building, Payette, Idaho. Loans up to \$2,500 for livestock, machinery, group services, building repair, cash rent, feed, seed, water facilities and other operating goods

can be made to veterans who have served in the armed forces of the United States during the period from September 16, 1917, to the end of the war. The amount of the loan will be based on the veteran's income and the value of the property to be purchased. The FSA will also make loans to veterans who are unable to secure adequate credit from banks. FSA will also make loans to veterans who are unable to secure adequate credit from banks.

The county administrator, which reviews and passes on applications will give special consideration to veterans' applications, but under present FSA authority, no relative preference. Loans are accompanied by management assistance where needed, but the applicant must have a good credit record and are generally repaid over a three-year period. The average loan is around \$1,000 but can be higher where the farm and the veteran's experience justify it.


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
