

Robert M. Lattig Receives Citation

AN EIGHTH AIR FORCE LIBERATOR STATION, England—First Lieutenant Robert M. Lattig, of Payette, Idaho, a veteran heavy bomber pilot, on a B-24 Liberator bomber, has recently been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for "extraordinary achievement" in bombing missions over Germany and occupied Europe.

Lieutenant Lattig is a member of the oldest Liberator heavy bombardment group in the Eighth Air Force. Besides the DFC and Air Medal with three Oak Leaf Clusters, he also wears the Distinguished Unit Ribbon. His unit was cited by the War Department for action in the Battle of Ploesti on August 1, 1943, entitling all officers and enlisted men in the organization to wear the ribbon.

During his career with the great fleets of Eighth Air Force "heavies," Lieutenant Lattig has participated in assaults on Berlin (twice), Furth, Achmer, Gotha, Friedrickshaven, Frankfurt, Hanford, Munster, Munich, Tutuw, Brunswick (twice), Ludwigshaven and targets in the Pas de Calais area.

Dog Training Starts August 15

Training of bird dogs in the field will be permitted after August 15 the Idaho fish and game department reminded hunters today. The closed season on running of dogs on all kinds of game birds began April 1. Spring and early summer months are set aside as a forbidden period because nesting birds

and later the young chicks need protection.

First shooting season begins September 1 when hunters may go out for Hungarian partridge in Ada Canyon, Boise, Gem, Payette, Washington, Elmore and Adams counties, except Meadows Valley in Adams county. The season lasts 19 days. Bag and limit possession limit is six birds.

Pheasant season follows in October, beginning in northern Idaho October 15, in southwestern Idaho October 22, and in southeastern and southern Idaho October 29.
