FLORENCE VAN DYKE DIES HERE OCT. 8
Miss Florence Van Dyke was born at Princeton, N. J. Oct. 12, 1850. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Matthew Van Dyke. They moved to Pittsburgh, Ohio in 1853. Later they sailed down the Ohio river to Arrowrock, Missouri. She taught school there, and then came west to Oregon in 1907. She taught school near Burns, Oregon. Her sister Lynn came to Ontario in 1927, where they lived together. Miss Florence did sewing after retiring as a teacher. She knitted many sweaters for soldiers in the last war.

Miss Lynn and Miss Florence Van Dyke came to Payette May 7, 1942. Her sister passed away last February. Florence died Oct. 8, 1944 at the age of 94 years, 11 months and 26 days. Her nearest relative is a nephew, Leonard Van Dyke of Marshal, Missouri. She was a member of the Baptist church.

Burial was in the Parma cemetery.
