

## Aerial Gunner Home From Italy

S/Sgt. Harry Kuester, armored gunner on a B-24 bomber, was an arrival last week for a visit with his wife and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Freeman, of Oregon Slope.

Sgt. Kuester has finished his 50 missions over enemy territory out of Italy. He was awarded the D. F. C. for extraordinary achievement in aerial flight showing a high order of courage, leadership and skill during a mission over Vienna, Austria. He also won the air medal with two oak leaf clusters.

In his many missions, he has bombed targets over Austria, Germany, Roumania, France, Hungary and several other places. Kuester had the honor of being the first in his squadron to complete his missions and was one of ten in the group to earn a trip to Cairo, Egypt.

During his missions, he had many close calls, but fortunately none of his crew was injured.

After his visit at home he will go to Santa Monica, Cal., for reassignment.
