Four Hurt In Auto Crash

Four people were slightly hurt and two cars were badly damaged in an auto wreck at 9:20 election night on North Eighth street in front of the telephone company's office.

Henry Manser, Orpha Rupp, Mrs. Mary Rupp and Emery Calkins were all treated for face lacerations and shock at the local hospital and allowed to return to their homes shortly afterward.

The Calkins car was damaged beyond repair and the Manser auto to the extent of about \$300 police officers report.

The two Rupp ladies were riding in the Calkins car. Police are continuing their investigation of the case.

Payette Organizes For Paralysis Drive

"The Payette county chapter for Infantile Paralysis has two very important functions, first to insure adequate treatment for every case of poliomyelitis in the county; and second to plan and sponsor the annual Fund Raising campaign to secure the support of the program of research and education, carried on by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis," said Mrs. John E. Hayes, Twin Falls, state representative of the Foundation, at a meeting of the chapter Friday evening, Nov. 3 at the courthouse.

"Any polio victim needing help may appeal to the chapter for whatever care is needed." The chapter, through its woman's activity chairman, Mrs. Alice Bulmer, is attempting to register every case in the county. Although there has been only one, new cases this year there are 10 cases under 21 years reported by the Department of Public Health and six cases over 21. Mrs. Bulmer will appreciate information on any case in the county.

Christmas Gifts For Servicemen

The world's largest Christmas party for hospitalized servicemen and women is being planned by the American Legion and its auxiliary.

The 12,065 posts of the American Legion and the 9,449 units of the American Legion auxiliary, with their combined memberships of more than 2,100,000, will seek, in cooperation with Eddie Cantor's new radio show, "Time to Smile,"

to collect 500,000 Christmas gift boxes for delivery to every wounded and sick fighting man and woman in a government hospital in the United States on December 25. Both the national executive committees of the Legion and its auxiliary approved the project enthusiastically at their meetings in Chicago during the 1944 national convention.

All citizens will be urged to join in making it a merry Christmas for the hospitalized service folks, under the slogan, "Christmas gifts to Yanks who gave."

Stores in all communities will cooperate, either through arrangements with their local American Legion posts and auxiliary units, or through their national associations, under blanket agreements with national headquarters of the American Legion and its auxiliary.

All stores will be asked to play up purchase by shoppers of standardized gift boxes which the stores will turn over to the nearest American Legion posts or units. Or buyers may take their gift boxes themselves to such Legion posts or units.

Gifts purchased in any community will be distributed by the Legion and auxiliary as close to home as possible, with any surplus redirected to the next closest hospital, so that no serviceman or woman in a hospital on Christmas day will be without Yule box. For details call Mrs. Lee Coblentz.

the war.

Mr. Hanigan, Larry Brainard, J. C. Palumbo, D. B. McKenzie and Pat Murphy attended the meeting at Weiser and were much impressed with Mr. Carlson's explanation of the CEI task. Mr. Hanigan said Monday that a general chairman would be named for Payette in the near future and the committee would begin its work. In a city, the size of Payette, the survey will probably include, besides business firms, building of proposed new homes in the city and on farms in the vicinity; farm improvements, extra farm labor needed and so on with the number of man hours work they will provide. With this reserve of projects, many of which can be undertaken immediately after victory, the committee believes returning service men and women and defense workers can be absorbed back into industry in an orderly manner.

The overall picture of the committee's plan is that if each community can take care of its own pre-war citizens the problem will be solved.
