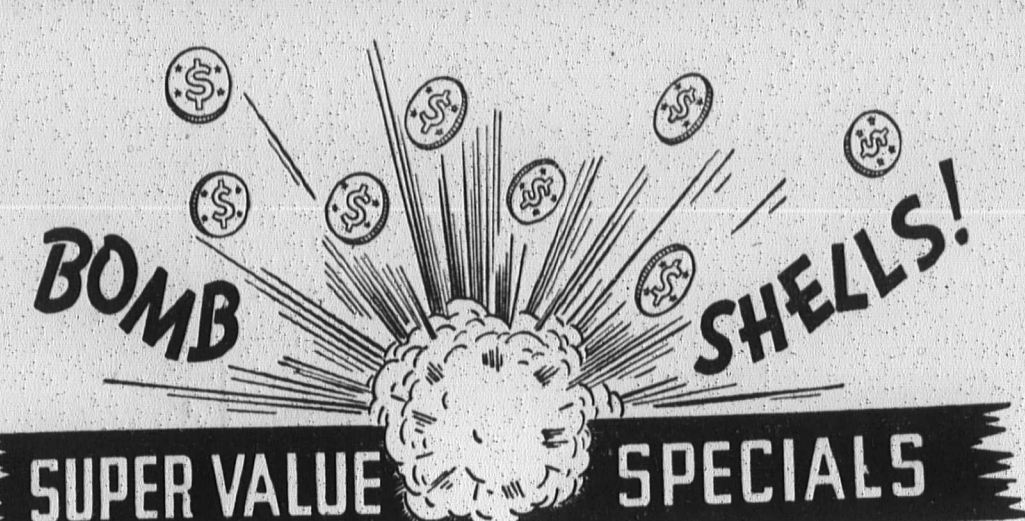
Mr. and Mrs. Roy White are enjoying a month's visit from their son, Ralph White of Hickam Field, Honolulu after a three and a half years absence.
