Pheasant Season Closes Nov. 21

Southwestern Idaho counties of Ada, Canyon, Elmore, Gem, Gwydhe, Payette, Washington, Adams and Boise have pheasant shooting until Nov. 21, according to the state fish and game department.
The bag and possession limit in this district is four birds, including only one hen.

Pheasants and Hungarian partridge may be shot in counties north of Salmon river on Sundays, Wednesdays and holidays from October 15 to November 25, Armistice day and the federal Thanksgiving day, November 23, are holidays on which shooting may be done. Bag limit for pheasant is three and for partridge, five.

Bobwhite quail may be shot in Clearwater, Lewis, Nez Perce, Latah and all of Idaho county north of Salmon river and east of Little Salmon river; on the same, jump dates until November 25. The limit is five.

Sealed proposals will be received by the Commissioner of Public Works of the State of Idaho, at the office of the commissioner of Public Works in Boise, Idaho, until two o'clock p. m. on the 1st day of December, 1944, for furnishing crushed gravel surfacing in stockpiles adjacent to Highway U. S. 95, known as Miscellaneous Project No. S-1340 in Canyon and Payette Counties.

Proposals will be opened and publicly read at the above stated hour.

Plans, specifications, form of contract, proposal forms and other information may be obtained at the office of the Bureau of Highways, Boise, Idaho.

A charge of two dollars (\$2.00) will be made for each set of plans, payments to be made by check payable to the Department of Public Works, State of Idaho.

All proposals must be made on the forms furnished, and must be signed by the bidder, with his name and postoffice address.

The right is reserved to reject all proposals, or to accept the proposal or proposals deemed best for the

State of Idaho.

No proposals will be considered unless accompanied by an acceptable Proposal Guaranty in an amount not less than 5 per cent of the total amount of the Proposal. This guaranty may be in the form of (a) cash, b) a certified check or cashier's check drawn on an Idaho bank made payable to the Commissioner, or (c) a bidder's bond.

It is the purpose of the Commissioner to build the improvement in the shortest time consistent with good construction. Necessary equipment and an effective organization will be insisted upon.

The attention of the bidders is directed to Section 108.01 of the 1941 State Standard Specifications covering subletting or assigning the contract.

The minimum wage paid to all unskilled labor employed on this contract shall be .75 cents per hour. The minimum wage paid to all intermediate grade labor employed on this contract shall be .90 cents per hour. The minimum wage paid to all skilled labor employed on this contract shall be \$1.10 per hour.
