

### P. O. URGES "SHOP NOW" MAIL IN NOVEMBER

Public response to the post office department's "Shop Now! Mail In November" campaign is good but needs to be better, according to Postmaster General Frank C. Walker.

"Extraordinary wartime conditions face us," Mr. Walker said. "Unless more people buy and mail this month the postal service cannot do its job of delivering all Christmas gifts on time."

"It is not pleasing to us to have to ask the American people to mail packages so far in advance of the delivery date. We do so only because it has to be done. The job is a tremendous one, but we are confident that it will be done because we know from experience that given sound reasons Americans cooperate magnificently."

L. M. Bowman, Payette's postmaster reports that excellent response was received in the recent campaign for mailing service men's Christmas packages and that already many are mailing other Christmas parcels in response to the campaign for mailing all packages early.

### Check Chimney

### VACUUM CLEANER PRICE BASIS SET

Makers of new household vacuum cleaners and attachments may agree to sell these products at prices that can be increased up to maximum prices that will be in effect when the cleaner is delivered,

as a result of action taken by the Office of Price Administration. Thus buyers can place orders for the new cleaners and manufacturers agree to deliver them at the maximum price that will be set by OPA when production begins. However, the action specified that no

seller may deliver or make an agreement to deliver new vacuum cleaners at prices to be adjusted upward in accordance with a maximum price to be set after delivery unless authorized by OPA. But no such authorization will be given at retail.


