Fruitland Gunner Wins Promotion

15TH AAF IN ITALY—Harry D. Spencer, 22, Fruitland, Idaho, left waist gunner in a B-24 Liberator group commanded by Lt. Col. Philip R. Hawes, Pearl River, N. Y., has recently been promoted to the grade of sergeant.

Spencer has been overseas since early October and has flown with

his squadron, led by Major Joseph N. Donovan, Houston, Texas, to attack such important Nazi targets as the airfields and aircraft factories near Vienna, Austria, one of the most heavily defended areas on the European continent, and numerous vital communication centers in France, Yugoslavia, Hungary, Germany and Greece.

He entered the AAF on Sept. 28, 1942, prior to this time he was employed by the Iron Fireman Manufacturing Co., Portland, Ore., as a machinist.

Lt. Stauff Gets Oak Leaf Cluster

AN EIGHTH AIR FORCE BOMBER STATION, England—First Lieutenant Oscar B. Stauff, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Oscar B. Stauff, Sr., of Payette, Idaho, has been awarded an Oak Leaf cluster to his Air Medal, it was recently announced by the commanding general, Eighth Air Force.

Lieutenant Stauff is the navigator of a B-17 Flying Fortress, and is a veteran of many of the Eighth Air Force's huge daylight bombing assaults against the Nazi war machine. He has participated in missions over Hamburg, Frankfurt and Cologne, which were carried out with excellent results and greatly aided our ground forces. The courage, coolness and skill displayed by Lieutenant Stauff on these occasions reflect great credit upon himself and the Armed Forces of the United States.

A graduate of the Payette high school, Lieutenant Stauff was attending the University of Idaho when he entered the Army Air Force, in 1942.

Sgt. Brown Now An Instructor

ALEXANDRIA, La.—T/Sgt. Wilbur F. Brown, of R.F.D. 2, Payette, has been assigned as an instructor at Alexandria Army Air Field, a Flying Fortress combat crew training center.

Alexandria Army Air Field is part of the Second Air Force, which trains the bulk of heavy bombardment crews in the United States.

Sgt. Brown has seen 15 months with the armed services in Porto Rico and Italy. He was awarded the Presidential Unit Citation, Distinguished Flying Cross, Air Medal with Silver Cluster.

Sgt. Brown attended Payette high school.

Sgt. Brown is the son of James T. Brown, R.F.D. 2, Payette, Idaho. He has a brother in the armed forces.

LIGHT NAPTHA UNDER RATIONING

Light Naptha, the petroleum product normally used for cooking and


lighting, will be brought under rationing control, effective November 20, in 15 Midwestern states, the Office of Price Administration states. This is being done to prevent the illegal use of this product as a motor fuel—a practice that has become prevalent in the area. Legitimate users of light Naptha can apply to their local rationing boards for issuance of "E" and "R" non-highway gasoline coupons for such rationed Naptha as they may need in bulk. No coupons will be needed to buy that which is already packaged in containers of less than eight ounces. Local boards can deny requests for light Naptha for home dry cleaning—it is not well adapted to such use—if a suitable non-rationed substitute can be found at reasonable cost.
