SPECIALIST INSPECTS STORED ONIONS - Earle Blodgett, plant pathologist from the University of Idaho was here Saturday and in company with Allerton Patch, acting county

agent, inspected a number of large warehouses and cellars where onions are stored. The men found in a few cases that some of the onions were spoiling due to dampness and lack of control of temperature. In each such case they recommended to the owner remedial measures.

On the whole however they found that the onions were generally in good shape.

There are perhaps more onions stored now than ever before. Patch said, and practically every bit of available space is being used for them.

Easy to bake for Holiday eating. THE HOLIDAY season is "just around the corner" and now is the time to think about the good things we can bake - good things to top off any fine dinner! For example, a fruit cake or a special pie or a holiday pudding. BARK FRUIT CAKE: 1 cup enriched flour, 2 cups seedless raisins, 1 tsp. nutmeg, 1/2 cup thinly sliced citron, 1/2 tsp. cloves, 1/2 tsp. salt, 1/2 cup thinly sliced candied orange peel, 1/2 cup shortening, 1/2 cup brown sugar, firmly packed, 4 eggs. Sift and measure flour; sift again with spices and salt. Cream shortening; add sugar gradually, creaming until light and fluffy. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add flour mixture gradually, combining thoroughly. Fold in fruits and nuts; mix. Pour into loaf pan (8x4x3) lined first with well-greased manila, then waxed paper. Bake in slow oven (275° F.) 2 1/2 hours or until done. Makes 1 loaf. Note: Cake is the "quick-baking" type. May be stored for only a few weeks.
