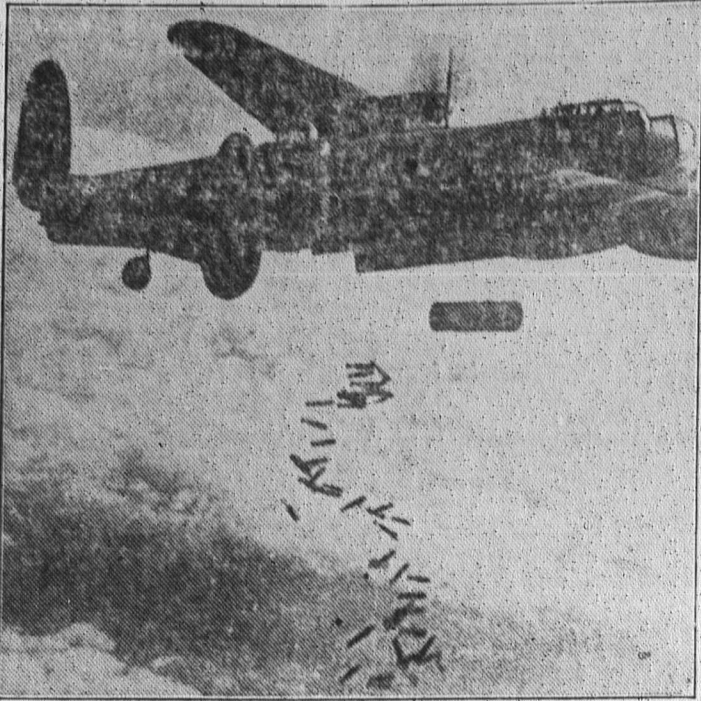


Bombs on Germany

Wilbur F. Brown Army Instructor

Alexandria, La., Dec. 10—Tech. Sgt. Wilbur F. Brown, of Payette, has been assigned as an instructor at Alexandria Air Field, a Flying Fortress combat crew training center.

Alexandria Army Air Field is part

of the Second Air Force, which trains the bulk of heavy bombardment crews in the United States.

T. Sgt. Brown has seen action with the armed forces in Puerto Rico and Italy for 15 months. He has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Air Medal with a silver leaf in lieu of five oak leaf clusters and a Presidential Unit Citation.

T. Sgt. Brown attended Payette high school. His brother, Cpl. James H. Brown, is in the engineers. He is the son of James T. Brown, of Route 2, Payette.

FACE OF WAR TELLS CONSUMER STORY

The intensified pace of fighting on all fronts tells consumers the story of home front supplies. Shortages must continue indefinitely. Our armies are shooting off munitions at such a rate that demands on the labor supply and raw materials are further increased. Thus the civilian story continues to be one of "patch, mend, conserve, make it do." Some examples: About 90,000 workers needed immediately to man work stations in plants producing "topmost" war items. Military demands for all types of gasoline up to 800,000 barrels a day in 1944 from 150,000 barrels a day in 1941. Scarcely half enough radio receiving tubes have been available in the past two years, to replace those worn out, and shortages expected to last several months beyond defeat of Germany and Japan.

Seventh Mission Lucky For Sponsor

15TH AAF IN ITALY—Sgt. Harry D. Spencer, 22, Fruitland, Idaho, left waist gunner in a B-24 Liberator group commanded by Col. Philip R. Hawes, Pearl River, N. Y., recently flew his seventh combat mission over enemy territory. Upon landing at his base after participating in an attack on the oil refineries, at Blechhammer, Germany, he said: "The sky was

filled with flak and it had me worried until I remembered it was number seven for me. Seven being a lucky number I stopped worrying."

He entered the AAF on Sept. 23, 1942 and received training at the gunnery school, at Fort Myers, Fla. Prior to his entry into the army, he was employed by the Iron Fireman Manufacturing Co., Portland, Ore., as a machinist.

His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Harry P. Spencer, live at Fruitland.

Both Class A and Class B tourna-

ments will be judged by the officials each evening and it will be possible for a school with a perfect record to make a total of 960 points for the four evenings of play.

Following are the points as decided upon by the committee:

1. Kind of sportsmanship shown toward tournament officials and their decisions.
2. Type of sportsmanship shown toward all opponents, whether in active play or on the sidelines.
3. Co-operation between yell leaders, student body and team.
4. Co-ordination, appearance and neatness in dress of yell leader.
5. Sportsmanlike conduct of players and coach as reported by tournament officials.
6. Deductions for unsportsmanlike conduct of townspeople; this will be charged against the home school.
7. A bonus of 10 points is to be given each evening for an organized stunt.
8. A bonus to a maximum of 10 points is to be given to a school for any positive demonstration of sportsmanship on the part of the players and the student body.

Judges for the tournament were appointed, however, their names are not being announced at the present time as the committee feels that it is to the best interest of the program that their names be kept under cover. It may be stated, however, that judges for the Class B tournaments were selected from administrators of Class A schools and that judges for Class A tournaments were selected from administrators of Class B schools. In the judgment of the committee, the selection of school officials for judges would be wise as they are more or less agreed upon what constitutes good sportsmanship in school tournaments. Their experience will help in their judging.

Lords decided to scuffle for another foxhole nearby and just as he moved into the open a sniper clipped him with a slug in the left

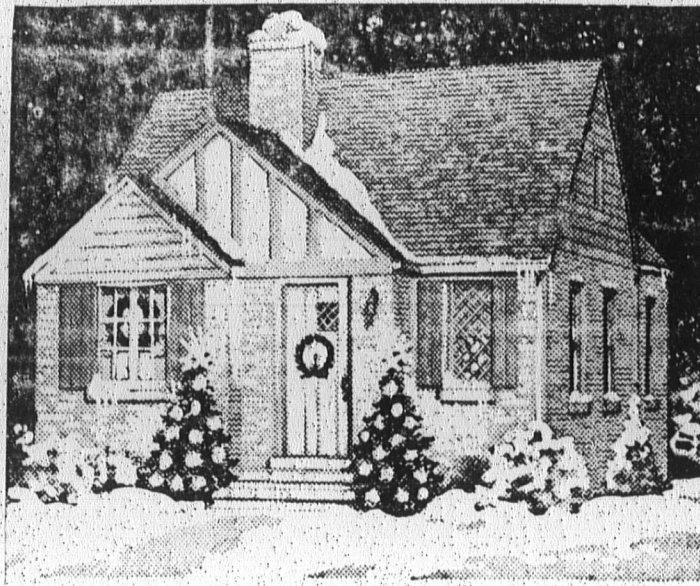
leg. The Marine private arrived in San Francisco on Nov. 4 and from there he was transferred, last week, to the Farragut hospital. His leg still is in a full cast.
