EXTENSION ON IRISH POTATO PRICE-SUPPORT

Basic prices maintained for Irish

potatoes under the 1944 price-support program have been extended through April, 1945, by WFA. Formerly it covered only the period through December, 1944. This extension is prompted by the unusual rate of movement of late-crop potatoes from surplus producing states during the early months of the marketing season and is expected to encourage growers and shippers in these states to sell at a more normal rate by affording them greater security against the possibility of declining markets. In northern Idaho support prices for Burbank potatoes range from \$1.90 in November to \$2.35 in April, and for other varieties the prices range from \$1.80 to \$2.25. For other counties in the state, rates ranging from \$2 in November to \$2.45 in April cover all other varieties of potatoes.
