Local Woman Heads Five Generations

Occasionally a person lives to see five generations of the family, but to be at the head of five generations eight different times is something rare. This distinction belongs to Mrs. Sarah J. McMillin, 94, of Payette, Idaho, a former resident of Veneta. Her daughter, Mrs. E. E. Hunter of Veneta, has six of the grandchildren, and another daughter, Mrs. Edward Adams, Chambers, Nebr., has the other two.

The first of these grandchildren was through Mrs. Melvin Thaxton of Eugene whose two daughters complete two of the five generations in the same family, which also is unusual.

Many people have grandchildren in the U. S. forces, but Mrs. McMillin has had five great grandsons serving their country in this war, besides great grandsons-in-law and grandsons.

A nephew of Benjamin Franklin, Mrs. McMillin's grandfather, Franklin, was among Oregon's earliest pioneers in the Portland vicinity. Her Grandfather Hunt was also one of the very early pioneers near Toledo.

Mrs. McMillin was 94 last July. Her Grandfather Franklin lived to be 102 years old.

Potatoes in livestock rations are generally comparable in feeding value to good corn silage.

Still Goodly Number Of Unrationed Goods

While the over-all food rationing program has been tightened by restoration of point values to five vegetables and application of points to 85 percent of the total meat supply, there remain a substantial number of foods for which rationing points are not needed, states OPA. All frozen and dried fruits and vegetables, fruit spreads, lard, soups, baked beans and baby foods—along with fresh fruits and vegetables, cereals, eggs poultry, and fish—are unrationed. In the meat list no point value is attached to beef hearts, sweetbreads and beef tongue; lamb is unrationed on such cuts as breast and flank, shanks of all grades, patties, steaks, chops and roasts in utility grade, hearts, liver, sweetbreads and tongue; all grades of mutton are point-free; veal is unrationed in such classes of cuts as breast, flank meat, neck, shank and heel meat of all grades in utility grade and lower for steaks, chops and roasts, and also hearts, sweetbreads and tongue. No points are needed to buy pork fat backs, clear plates, hocks, jowls, knuckles, regular plates and bacon ends, hearts, liver and tongue. A number of sausage types are also on the no point list.

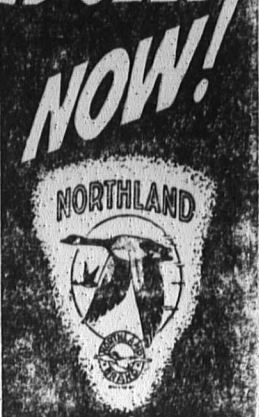

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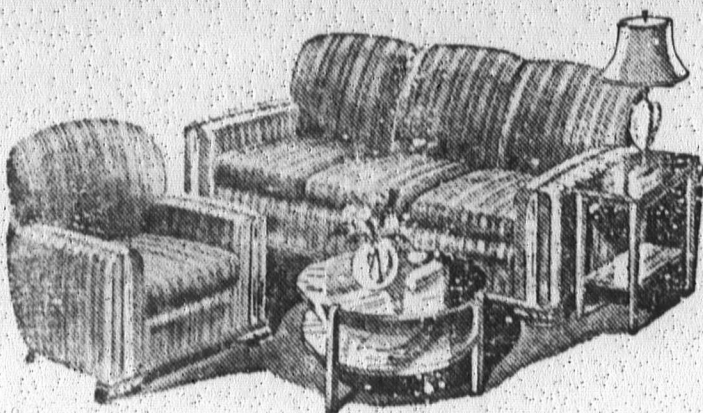
