HEALTH OF NATION SHOWS NO SERIOUS DECLINE

Despite the strains of three years of wartime living and working, and an increasing shortage of physicians, psychiatrists, nurses and hospital facilities, the physical and mental health of America's civilians shows no indication of a serious decline, the Office of War Information states in a comprehensive report on the state of the Nation's health. It adds, however, a warning from Surgeon General Parran that our lines against disease are lightly held, and that shortages of health and medical manpower leave us vulnerable to a breakthrough on many fronts. The shortage of doctors continues to be more acute in rural areas than in towns and cities. Sanitation in many rural parts of the country remains at a low level. Correction of deficiencies in the Nation's sanitary equipment would require construction of about 11,500 water systems, adequate sewerage facilities in more than 10,500 communities, safe water and privies for 5,000,000 rural homes, 400 milk pasteurization plants in 34 states.

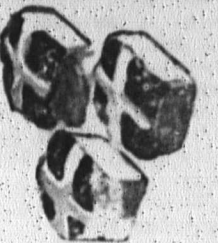

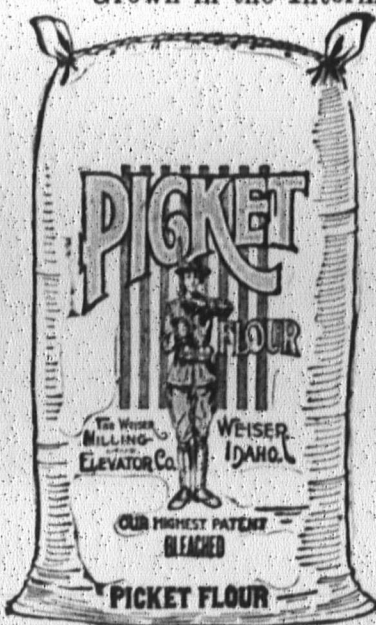

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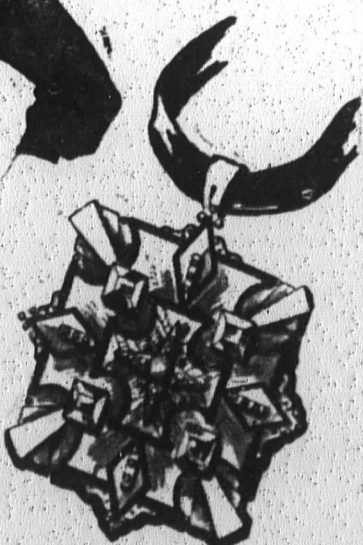
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
