Funeral Rites Held For C. H. Bowman

Funeral rites for Chas. H. Bowman, former Payette, councilman who died in Portland, Ore., March 26, were held here last Thursday. The Rev. C. G. Hannan, of the Methodist church gave the sermon and Landon's were in charge of interment.

Chas. Henry Bowman was born Sept. 16, 1861, at Marshalltown, Iowa.

He was united in marriage to Miss Harriet Nodde April 4, 1883.

Six children were born to them, four of whom died in infancy.

He went to Butte, Montana, in 1888, where he was engaged in the grocery business. Later he moved to Salt Lake City, and then, in 1908, he came to Payette, and engaged in the poultry and egg business. He served for a number of years on the city council here.

Mrs. Bowman died in January, 1931, and a son, died in 1932. Since then Mr. Bowman had made his home with his daughter, Mrs. Minnie Williams, first in Payette and later in Portland, Oregon, where he moved the last time in 1941.

He is survived by his daughter, Mrs. Williams, by two brothers, Richard, of Portland, Ore. and William, of Marshalltown, Ia.; one sister, Mrs. Geo. Spitzer, of Brae, Cal., four grandsons, two of whom are in the service, and two great-grandsons.

He was a member of the I.O.O.F. and the Rebekahs in Butte, Mont. Death came to Mr. Bowman last

Monday, March 26, 1945. He had been in the hospital for six months as the result of a broken hip, and had only been home seven weeks when he passed away from a stroke.

fully one semester or quarter of college work before the age of 17 years 9 months.

3. Citizenship: Applicant must be a citizen of the United States.

4. ASTRP Qualifying Test: Applicant must achieve a qualifying score on the test administered April 12, 1945:

5. Parental Consent: Applicant must have written consent from a parent or guardian approving his request for enlistment in ERC and for assignment to the ASTRP.

6. Enlistment in ERC: Applicant must enlist in the ERC on or before June 20 for assignment to the July term, on or before July 20 for assignment to the August term, and on or before August 31 for assignment to the September term.
