match was held using the names of vegetables. The rest of the time was spent at games and refreshments were served.

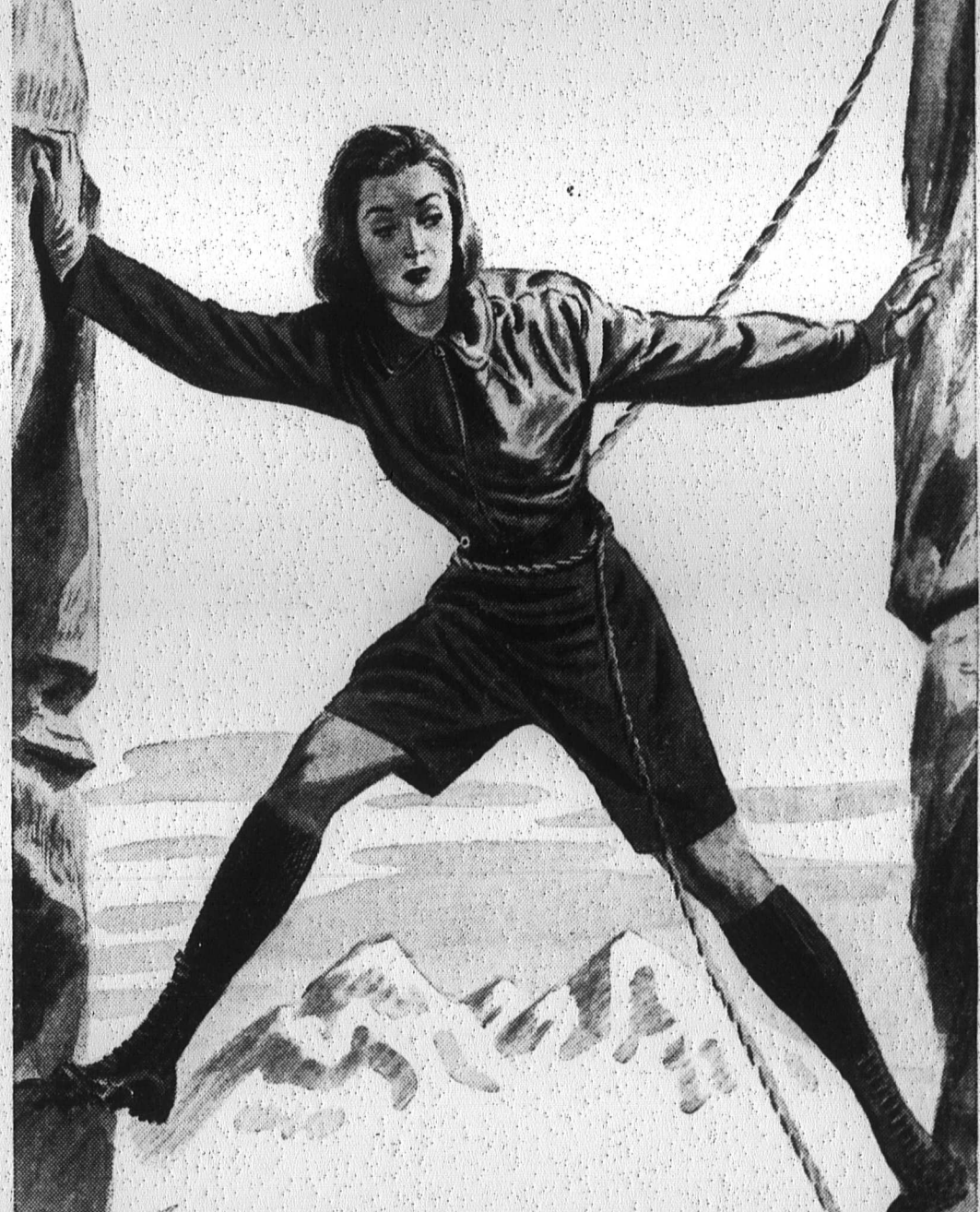
