## Payments To Milk Producers

Payments covering milk or cream produced during the first quarter of this year will be made to milk producers starting April 1 in Payette county. The AAA office announced this week. Payments will continue to be made on a quarterly basis throughout the rest of the year also. Sixty cents per hundredweight will be paid for whole milk produced in Southern Idaho and 10 cents per pound will be paid for butterfat in all areas of the state. Producers have two months in which to apply for payment, and may either call at the county office in person or mail in their evidence of sale, as has been done in the past.

## Charles Starks Is Promoted

AN EIGHTH AIR FORCE STATION, England.—The promotion of Charles T. Starks, 24, Payette, from sergeant to staff sergeant has been announced at this Eighth Air Force B-17 Flying Fortress base. A member of the 95th Bombardment group, commanded by Colonel Jack E. Shuck of Casper, Wyo., the sergeant is the engineer and top turret gunner on a Flying Fortress.

Sgt. Starks is a member of the Fortress group which was cited by the President for leading the first American bombing attack on targets in Berlin, in March, 1944, and was cited previously for its outstanding bombing assault on railroad marshaling yards at Munster, Germany, in October, 1943. As a component of the distinguished Third Air Division, the group also shared in a Presidential citation given the entire division for its historic England-Africa shuttle bombing of an important Messerschmitt fighter plane plant at Regensburg, Germany, in August of 1943. While flying more than 300 combat missions, the 95th has dropped over 17,000 tons of bombs on Germany and German held targets.

The AAF gunner, son of Mr. and Mrs. S. H. Starks of Payette, Idaho, was formerly employed in construction work at Mountain Home, Idaho.

The sergeant's wife, Mrs. Cleo J. Starks, lives in Payette.
