Woodrow Fitch Writes From Pacific

The following interesting letter was written by Captain Woodrow Fitch to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Scott Fitch who now live at Banning, Calif., and sent by them to Mr. and Mrs. Neil Fitch here. Neil Fitch, who is now head recruiter for the Navy at Boise, and Captain Fitch are cousins.

The captain was reared in Payette and attended the local schools while his family resided in this city. He has been in the South Pacific for some time. The letter follows:

Feb. 28, 1945

Dear Folks:

Well my stay in the hospital was short and sweet in on the 24th and out on the 28th. I had one of my attacks of Dengue. It is a queer fever. You never notice it until you get very tired and lose a lot of sleep. Then you wake up in the morning, (as I did) with a chill, followed by high fever. Well, they flew me to the hospital. I slept for two days and nights. They woke me up every 4 hours to take a big slug of sulfaguanadine and back to sleep I'd go. Pretty soon my fever went down and the next day my dysentery cleared up and then I started to eat and now I feel O. K. A few days rest will bring back my strength.

Well, since Feb. 25 I have been drawing captain's pay. I'm still a 1st Lt., but I have in 10 years of service. Good old National Guard. And yesterday I was put in for a battlefield promotion to captain. My work with certain people is of such a nature that I can't tell you about it in this letter but I'll be home in a year or so and then I can tell you all about it.

I stopped in to see my old Payette outfit today but couldn't find a soul I knew. Capt. Baldrige was up front. Bobby Heithecker was home on furlough. Judy and Wallace and Stegall. You know where they are. I was on my way back from the hospital. I had met a captain in my outfit right here—that was from Bonpers Ferry. Met him in the hospital. He knew Maize at the university. Name of Bob Klie-war. I met another fellow with a long Italian name from Payette. Lived out by the Snake river bridge he said. I was in a hurry to get back so didn't stay long.

Well folks, guess I'd better ring off. No new notches in the gunstock.

Payette Man On Pennsylvania

ABOARD THE USS PENNSYLVANIA SOMEWHERE IN THE PACIFIC—Although Radio Tokyo has reported her sunk several times, the USS Pennsylvania is still very much afloat, as members of her crew, including Howard Robert McCain, seaman second class, USNR, husband of Mrs. Freda J. McCain, of 1514 N. 6th St., Payette, Idaho, will testify.

The first public announcement of her record in the Pacific, made recently at Advance Pacific Fleet headquarters, tells of her participation in 13 amphibious operations and of her part in the defeat of the large Japanese Naval force in the Battle for Leyte Gulf on October 24 and 25, 1944. The "Pennsy," as her crew knows her, has possibly shot more main battery ammunition at enemy positions than any other ship—more than 11,000,000 pounds.

This old, broad-beamed Pearl Harbor "ghost," whose keel was laid in October 27, 1913, has covered nearly 100,000 miles of Pacific water, from the Bearing Sea to Southern Australia. For a period of four months she cruised in waters west of Tokyo.
