Wounded Payette Officer Recuperating

THE 104TH GENERAL HOSPITAL, England—Suffering minor shrapnel wounds in the drive to hurl the Nazis out of their Ardenne salient Second Lieutenant Isaac H. Cole, 29, of 844 North Seventh St., Payette, Idaho, is now recuperating at this United States Army general hospital in England.

Paratroop battalion adjutant who had been in combat since his D-day jump in Normandy, Lt. Cole wounded north of Bastogne.

"We'd driven the Krauts out of the woods and began setting up our position," he said. "About one o'clock in the morning just as I had finished breaking down the company supplies, the Jerries began shelling. A tree burst sent some shrapnel into my left thigh and I

was evacuated to England by hospital boat."

His ward surgeon, Captain Chas. A. Skinner of Madison, N. J., said he is making rapid progress and will return to duty soon. Lt. Cole has received the Purple Heart. He was awarded the Bronze Star in Normandy.

Former logger for the Moore Lumber company of Wallaw, Ore., Lt. Cole entered the Army in August, 1942. His wife, Mrs. Elsie Anderson Cole, lives at the Seventh street address.
