1945 Goals Still Fit War Requirements

Keeping production in line with the 1945 state production goals is even more important than when these goals were established. War Food Administrator Marvin Jones reported to the nation's farmers after reviewing the entire feed situation. He emphasized the need is great for farmers to meet this huge production schedule which again will require the surmounting of many wartime handicaps. Although indications show that farmers will plant close to the high goal levels, planting intentions need to be increased for the oil crops, potatoes, sugar beets, dry beans, sweetpotatoes, feed grains and forage crops, and supplementary hay and pasture. Increases also are being urged in milk production, cattle slaughter and pig farrowing.

Ration-Free Sugar Again

Both sugar beet and sugarcane producers will receive a ration-free supply of sugar again this year. This supply is limited to 25 pounds for each member of the family and each employee who works more than six months a year on the farm, and a grower's total allocation may not exceed 25 pounds for each acre harvested for sale from the 1945 crop. This sugar will be allocated by sugar manufacturers.

Sgt. Bergmann Wins Cluster To Air Medal

AN EIGHTH AIR FORCE BOMBER BASE, England — Staff Sergeant Lawrence E. Bergman, 28, of Seneca, Kansas, waist gunner on an Eighth Air Force B-17 Flying Fortress, has been awarded the second Oak Leaf Cluster to his Air Medal. The award was for "meritorious achievement" during bombing attacks by Lieutenant Colonel Chester C. Cox's 388th Bomb Group against Nazi war industries and military targets in cooperation with Allied ground forces.


